DEAUVILLE RULED FINISH MAJESTIC IN BRITISH YARD

World's Largest Liner Being Deauville, writes a French correspond-Completed For Service.

MONTREAL, Sept. 29 .- A British ship yard is now completing the Majestic, which will be the largest vessel in the world when finished for the White Star

Majestic will have a gross tonnage of about 56,000, and a displacement of 64,000 tons, when loaded to her marks. The turbine machinery will develop a maximum of 100,000-horsepower, and it is intended that the vessel shall have an ample reserve to steam an average of 23 knots. The rudder posts, with plates, will weigh 140 tons, and the stern posts, with the brackets for the propeller shafts, will weigh more than 300 tons. 
