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ISSUE GENERAL CALL TO ARMS IN IRELAND

Will Give Premier King Hearing At Washington

HUGHES AWAITS CONFERENCE ON VITAL ISSUES

Canada's Prime Minister Is Expected in U. S. Capital On Wednesday.

DEMANDS RETALIATION
Washington Senator Seeks Tariff to Ban Entry of Dominion Fish.

Washington, July 6.—Premier W. L. Mackenzie King of Canada and U. S. Secretary of State Charles E. Hughes will confer in Washington next Wednesday.

The conference, which was arranged on the initiative of Premier King, taking in a number of questions of mutual interest to the two countries.

Demand that retaliatory measures against Canada be put into the proposed tariff bill in connection with the proposal to place a duty of two cents a pound on salmon, halibut, mackerel and other fish, was made in the senate today by Senator Jones of Washington.

He offered an amendment that no fresh or frozen salmon, halibut or swordfish from the North Pacific or tributary water, be admitted to the United States through any foreign country except when in bond from a United States port.

The amendment is aimed, Senator Jones explained, at certain Canadian regulations and orders-in-council intended to concentrate the fishing industry at Prince Rupert, B. C. The amendment seeks to induce United States fishermen to take their fish to Ketchikan, Alaska and Seattle, Wash.

In proposing the amendment, Senator Jones commended the energy and intelligence of Canadians in looking out for their fishing and shipping interests, and held it was up to the United States to show like intelligence.

The chairman of the senate finance committee held the amendment in violation of treaty rights.

HANG QUEBEC MURDERER.

St. Scholastique, Que., July 6.—Ossiah Ripeol was hanged in the county jail here this morning for the murder of Mrs. Marie Christiana Clermont. The execution was carried out by Hangman Ellis without a hitch. Ripeol's heart stopped beating thirteen minutes after the drop.

INDIANS TURN DOWN OTTAWA OFFER.

Brantford, July 6.—The offer of the minister of interior, Hon. Charles Stewart, to appoint a royal commission to investigate conditions on the Six Nations reserve was turned down flatly by the Six Nations council yesterday. The council met for the second day and again discussed Mr. Stewart's commission. There was opposition to turning down the offer, but the majority carried, and as far as could be learned this morning no further opening of the discussion was suggested by the chief.

Went Buy Gin or Whiskey At \$1 a Quart

PHILADELPHIA, July 6.—Genuine Gordon gin and "Johnny Walker" whiskey is going begging here for less than a dollar a quart. It became known today. The federal district attorney and the United States marshal have met with little luck in their effort to peddle a carload of liquors which prohibition agents had seized.

A bill of \$500 is due the railroad for freight and ice, and it is up to the government to pay it. The parties to whom the car was consigned declared they had no idea who shipped the liquor to them. They waived all interest in it.

BOOSTS VALUES IN WARD TWO

Commissioner Grant Predicts Increase of Nearly One Million.

Richter System Operating in London West Responsible For Advance.

When members of No. 1 committee of the city council receive assessment figures for Ward Two in the near future they will show an increase of approximately one million dollars. This fact was announced by Assessment Commissioner Stephen Grant Thursday, who states that the increase in assessment in this section will be nearly one million dollars.

Complete figures for Ward Two assessment are not yet available, but early computations indicate that the increase will be as noted above. This increase will be spread over income, real estate, building and business tax.

The chief advance in assessment for Ward 2 will be shown as made in London West, where the Richter system of assessment was put into force this year for the first time. As this system when put in operation in other portions of the city invariably showed an increase in assessment, Mr. Grant looks for the same result in Ward 2.

The assessment commissioner states that complete returns of assessment for ward two will be released July 12, and acting under instruction from No. 1 committee, he refuses to divulge the exact totals to date.

"I shall be pleased if the increased assessment in ward two reaches one million dollars," he stated. "It will be slightly under that amount."

DECLARES RAIL SHOPMEN PLAN TO GO ON STRIKE

James Somerville Makes Dominion Tour of Canadian Roads.

MEN WILL NOT SUBMIT
Asserts Action to Follow Enforcement of Sunday Work Conditions.

Moose Jaw, Sask., July 6.—James Somerville, international vice-president of the Machinists' Union, who returned to Moose Jaw last night from a tour of Canadian railways from Montreal to Vancouver, declared that shopmen throughout Canada are prepared to go on strike if railway companies persist in their attempt to enforce the terms announced during May upon the men. The men, declared Mr. Somerville, are determined that they are not going to submit to the conditions which the railways are attempting to impose on them, especially with regard to Sunday work.

The proposal of the railways is that the men should accept straight time for Sunday work and holidays. We established the payment of overtime for Sundays and holidays 23 years ago to eliminate as far as possible work on Sundays.

"If the company's proposal to pay straight time for Sunday work is accepted, we will debate Sunday the same as in the United States, and conditions which we believed we had overcome years ago, will be back," he said.

HOPE TO AVERT STRIKE.

CHICAGO, July 5.—Hope for the speedy settlement of country-wide strike of the railway shopmen was seen tonight in statements issued by Ben W. Hooper, chairman of the United States Railroad Labor Board, and B. M. Jewell, leader of the shop crafts, who ordered the walkout.

In reply to a letter from Mr. Hooper, Mr. Jewell declared that the strikers were willing to "consider any negotiations with anyone in authority for settlement of the strike."

"We are willing to confer with anybody in authority by the railroads to bring peace proposals to us," said Mr. Jewell. "I include or exclude nobody, but if the labor board, for instance, is in a position to do so, Turn To Page 9, Column 3.

BOY SEIZED WITH CRAMPS DROWNS

Montreal, July 6.—When Berthal Frenau, aged 13, and Napoleon Gendreau, aged 15, were swimming at the foot of Willbords street yesterday, Napoleon was seized with cramps. Berthal went to his rescue and both sank. They were seen by Jos. Menard, who was standing on the shore. He rowed out in a boat and managed to rescue Gendreau. Later he found young Frenau, and brought the two boys ashore, but only Gendreau could be revived.

160 People Overcome By Smoke In New York Underground Railway Fire

Mayor Hylan, Gassed While Leading Rescue Work In Tube, Orders Thorough Investigation of Blaze, To Commence Immediately.

New York, N. Y., July 6.—About 160 squad arrived its members donned their gas masks and attacked the flames. Mayor Hylan, one of the first city officials to arrive, was driven back by fumes when he attempted to descend the steps into the subway. He was too badly gassed to make a thorough investigation of the blaze be commenced at once.

CLEANS UP GROUNDS OF COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE

Kingston Construction Company Starts Men On Work To Complete Contract.

True to their word, and in accordance with their agreement, both written and oral, the Kingston Construction Company, creators of the new Central Collegiate Institute, are back at work.

Actual operations commenced on Wednesday afternoon, and a gang of men are busily engaged in clearing up generally about the buildings and grounds.

After his careful inspection of a week ago, L. E. Carrothers, school architect, explains, the contractors were granted a three-weeks' time limit in which to complete all tasks according to their contract, and remedy any defects that might be apparent. It is now believed, however, that these, as reported from time to time in past months, have been more or less mythical.

BEAUTY ONLY DEVELOPS AT 30

For Prettiness of Youth Is Merely Accident of Life

"A WOMAN'S real beauty does not begin to show until she is 30." This is the opinion of Anzia Yezierska.

She has looked squarely at life through the eyes of a sweatshop worker, a factory hand, a dishwasher, a struggling journalist, and now with the complex vision and understanding of a successful writer. "All women want to be beautiful themselves and to create beauty around them," she explains.

"When I fled to England from Russia, penniless, uneducated and friendless, I lived with the poorest workers—a worker myself, often without food and wretchedly clad. But there was never a time when I did not hunger more for beauty than for bread."

"But as I suffered and learned, I came to realize that one couldn't go out and get beauty ready-made, that it was something you had to develop from within."

"Beautiful clothes, money, fine surroundings are all quite empty unless one develops an inner something. The beauty of youth is natural, but it is only a mask one wears while developing the soul."

"To be beautiful at 20 is purely accidental. To be so at 60 is character."

"A woman is beautiful only when she has suffered and lived and learned to think—when she has the courage to make her own decisions and be herself. Then she is an individual. Individuality is real."

"Then a woman has generated a force which shines through her eyes, and illuminates her face—something more dynamic and electric than mere prettiness—something which lives and which attracts."

City's Cost of Government 7th Lowest In Canada

ON PER CAPITA BASIS.

CIVIC administration in London costs every citizen \$30.07 a year, according to returns from seventeen municipalities in Canada. The above figure is the lowest in the Dominion.

One city only in Ontario surpasses London in economy of municipal government, and that municipality is Windsor, the per capita cost of which is \$28.26 per year.

Municipal government is administered at the least per capita per year in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, which is \$11.93.

Edmonton leads the 17 Canadian cities in extravagance, the per capita cost of municipal government per year being \$56.06 in that center.

Those cities which surpass London in economical civic government are in order of saving, Charlottetown, Quebec, Halifax, Montreal, St. John and Windsor.

The per capita cost of Dominion Government is considered as uniform throughout Canada, and London pays \$41.30 per head for this administration in contrast to \$74.20 per capita in 1919, when war expenditures were charged up against the country.

In any province the per capita cost of provincial government is regarded as uniform for all municipalities in that province. The Drury government at this province.

TRUSTEES HOLD SECRET SESSION ON BRANCH HIGH

Officials Refuse To Divulge Results of "Star Chamber" Meeting.

SECOND MEETING SOON
Full Report Will Be Made to Next Regular Meeting of Board.

Once again the school trustees deem it advisable to meet in "star chamber" session. On this occasion it was the members of No. 3 committee, at the call of the chairman, Trustee A. E. Silverwood, who gathered Wednesday afternoon in secret parley to deal with such important issues as the completion of the Central Collegiate Institute as per contract, and the establishment of a South London high school, as ordered by the department of education in Toronto.

While Trustee A. E. Silverwood, chairman of No. 3 committee, W. A. Tanner, secretary of the board of education, and all members who were in attendance, maintain a strict silence as to what transpired, it is now known that the department of education will offer no opposition to the establishment of a temporary branch collegiate institute in the old Victoria public school, upon the assurance the trustees will not swerve from their original policy, and that steps will be taken at the first opportunity to provide two schools of this type in both East and South London.

Trustee Silverwood stated Thursday that another meeting will be held shortly, in order that the committee will have a full report to submit to the board at the next scheduled regular session, July 20.

Although it is several weeks since the trustees informed the provincial department that it was intended to use the Victoria School for this purpose, the only reply forthcoming was a reminder that the London board of education in 1920 promised that the establishment of a temporary branch collegiate institute was completed, steps would be taken to construct two branch colleges.

After a considerable delay the Toronto authorities referred the question back for further information incidentally withholding their approval of the proposition indefinitely. Nothing was subsequently heard and the trustees fear that it may yet be necessary to dispatch certain of their number to the provincial capital to personally explain that the city council and many of the citizens have expressed themselves as against any building this year.

MAY CHOOSE LADY WILSON.

London, July 5.—The Times states that Lady Wilson, widow of Field Marshal Henry H. Wilson, will be invited to stand as Unionist candidate for Parliament for North Down, her late husband's constituency.

London Dealers Receive Notice Of Advance Of 25c Per Cwt. On Sugar

Believe Large Demand Due to Canning Season, Is Responsible For Increased Price, Reported From Montreal.

Following the universal law of supply and demand, sugar is again on an upward climb.

This morning disconcerting news for the housewife, caught in the midst of the fruit-canning season, was contained in a dispatch from Montreal, announcing an increase of 25 cents a hundred pounds on all classes of refined sugar, making a total increase of 1.55 a hundred-weight since June 1.

Local dealers claim that the increase will affect retail prices immediately, although a new price had not been set late today. For the past several days sugar has been twelve pounds for \$1. The increase will probably amount to one-quarter of a cent a pound, or possibly a selling retail at an average price of little more.

The new factory price for sugar is \$7.25, while the new local wholesale prices will probably be \$7.60 and \$7.65 a hundredweight.

Dealers believe that the increase is due entirely to an increased demand for sugar, because of the fruit preserving season. Because of the bountiful harvest of small fruits, and fairly low prices as a result, there has been a considerable run on sugar for some time.

They are emphatic in their belief that the proposed new tax on beet sugar has nothing to do with the flight of prices. Beet sugar, they explain, is on the market only three months of the year, in the late fall and autumn. Even then, the beet product constituted less than one-tenth the total amount of sugar consumed in Canada, they say.

Prediction was made by one dealer that the new price level for sugar will prevail for some time, as the market everywhere is firm. He would not say, however, that he expected higher prices in the near future.

ASSERTS ATTACK ON O. T. A. "A POLITICAL DISGRACE"

Rev. Ben Spence Claims No Truth in Statement of Increased Secret Drinking.

Toronto, July 6.—The administration of the O. T. A. in this province is a great success, and the attacks upon it are a political disgrace," said Rev. Ben H. Spence when interviewed in connection with the statement of G. H. Ferguson that "the Drury government's administration had been a scandal, which was doing much to weaken respect for the law."

"There is absolutely no foundation for the statement with regard to increase of secret drinking," continued Mr. Spence. "The actual facts are entirely to the contrary. With the passing of the bar and public sale of liquor, all kinds of drinking has been lessened. There was more liquor sold illegally in the old license days than is sold illegally today. What prohibition has done has been not to cause bootlegging, but to show it up, and the evidence all emphasizes that fact."

"Prohibition as far as we have it, is an overwhelming success, but we want more of it."

Costs \$2 To Issue Check For Five Thousand

OTTAWA, July 6.—Canadian Press.—Some confusion apparently has arisen with regard to the date when the new stamp tax on checks will come into force. An official announcement today intimates that the new rate of fifty cents for every fifty dollars of the amount of money for which the check is drawn up to, but not exceeding \$5,000, will become effective on August 1, next. Checks drawn for any amount exceeding \$5,000 will be subject to the same tax as those drawn for \$5,000—namely, \$2.

TANK CAVES IN, KILLING FARMER

McKillop Man Fatally Injured in Wall Crash Near Logan.

Victim's Son Narrowly Escapes Fate in Cement Collapse.

Mitchell, July 6.—When Henry Rapine, 65 years old, stood in a cement tank on the farm of John Nicholson, near Logan, at 7:30 o'clock Thursday morning and took the props away to plaster the walls, the sides of the tank caved in, a piece of cement striking him on the head, wounding him so seriously that he died before medical attention could be obtained.

The victim and his 20-year-old son Leslie had the contract for building several feet of cement on the top of a water tank on Nicholson's farm. They completed the walls Monday.

Thursday morning when father and son arrived to do the plastering they found, when the props had been removed, that the walls were not dry, but before the father could escape a large section of the wall struck him on the head, knocking him unconscious. The son, who narrowly escaped a similar fate, succeeded in taking his parent out of the tank.

Dr. Proudlove of Monkton was called, but before he arrived Rapine had died.

Rapine was a resident of McKillop. Besides his widow, he is survived by five sons and two daughters at home and a married daughter, who resides in Elmira.

WOULD GIVE U.S. SHIPS TO POLAND

Warn Nation Republicans Seek To Discredit Erin Before Whole World.

FOUR SNIPERS SHOT DEAD

Twenty Buildings in Dublin Burned to Ground With Loss of \$2,000,000.

Dublin, July 6.—The provisional free state government has instructed the general headquarters staff of the volunteer organization to place its entire establishment on an active service basis.

The headquarters staff is directing officers commanding local units to appeal to all members to accept service for three months. All other citizens who desire to join the national ranks will also be recruited for the volunteer organization.

A general call to arms was issued this morning by the government in the form of a proclamation opening the war for the enlistment of those citizens who last week "were declined by the government because it was confident of the ability of the army single-handed to meet and defeat any attack made upon it."

The proclamation follows: "The valor and patriotism of our national army has broken the conspiracy to override the will of the nation and subject the people to a despotism based on brigandage and ruthlessness, regardless of the people's inalienable right to life, liberty and security."

"Spontaneous and eager offers of army service made by citizens last week were declined by the government because it was confident of the ability of the army single-handed to meet and defeat any attack made upon it."

"The army is now called upon to meet and defeat any attack made upon it. It is justly honored as the defender of the people."

"Events have shown, however, that while the present active strength of the army has been sufficient to deal adequately with the recent situation, there is a possibility of continued sporadic action which makes an increase in the army establishment very necessary."
