"But as I suffered and learned, I came to realize that one couldn't go out and get beauty ready-made, that was something you had to develop from within.

"Beautiful clothes, money, surroundings are all quite empty unless one develops an inner some-thing. The beauty of youth is natural, but it is only a mask one wears while developing the soul. "To be beautiful at 20 is purely accidental. To be so at 60 is character. "A woman is beautiful only when

she has suffered and lived and learned to think-when she has the courage to make her own decisions and be herself. Then she is an individual. Individuality is real.


