Proposed Legislation Filed at Toronto Gives Entire Church Property To Majority in Each Congregation Whether It Goes Unionist or Anti-Unionist.

ACCEPT VOTE TAKEN UNDER FEDERAL ACT

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Jan. 31.-Copies of the church union bill to be brough before the Ontario legislature at the forthcoming session, by which the majority rights of unionists and non-concurring members will be determined, were filed today with A. H. Sydere, the clerk of the

Up to the present no member has been selected to introduce the bill, but an announcement in this connection will be made later. The bill takes the congregation as the unit for the division of church property. Its sponsors assumed that it is impossible to find

a lower unit of distribution that would be practicable.

Goes With Majorities The principle of the bill is that the majority of the congregation takes the property with it, whether it goes into the united church or stays out and enters a non-concurring denomination or remains independent The federal act provides, of course

for the division of the general prop

erty and funds of the church as whole. Provision is made in the bill for the adoption of votes taken under the federal act, these to serve as mandates for the holding of the individual church property. This would avoid

the taking of a second vote. It is reported that the anti-union ists may argue for the provision of a two-thirds vote being necessary to carry the church property, holding carry the church property, holding that this is the law in the case of the sale or transfer of property in an incorporated company. If this were adopted, however, it would cut both ways and prevent a large number of anti-majorities from holding their anti majorities from holding their property as well as unionist ones.

There is a clause in the union bi to empower ministers to perform the ceremony of marriage, and prior ordinations are to be recognized. The act is to come into force or June 10, and provision is made for the adoption of the basis of union
