

KINGS AND QUEENS IN MOSCOW. The chess congress now being held in Moscow, with its terms of "kings" and "queens" and "knights," et cetera, strikes an incongruous

One can imagine the foreign players saying, "I'll declare my king," and being hushed into silence. "Kings" and "queens" would doubtless be turned into "comisars."

The more common pieces of the boards would be "comrades." But, as a matter of fact, the Soviet is financing the congress, and has not insisted on the terms of the royal game being changed. Even the bishops are safe.

Again the veteran Dr. Lasker, winner of the St. Petersburg tournament, as of the New York contest last year, will try his strength against the world champion, Capablanca, and his other familiar foeman, Rubenstein. The American champion, Marshall, and the brilliant young Mexican, Torre, are among the formidable entries. The important absentee is the Russian Alekhine, who in exile has no overpowering craving for Soviet hospitality.

This may be the last engagement of Lasker and Capablanca, foremost of the modern masters, for the German player is along in years. Lasker's play in the New York tournament, however, gave no evidence of failing powers; the only game he lost was to Capablanca, whom he excelled in the total point. Although he lost the world championship to the Cuban in their Havana duel, he has outrivaled his younger opponent as an international tournament player.

Whether either of these masters could play on even terms with Paul Morphy is a favorite speculation. Labourdonnais, the great French player, said of that astounding chess genius: "It is of no use playing him; it is simply uncertainty struggling against certainty." In supreme confidence, at any rate, Capablanca is peerless. It is characteristic of his assurance that he thinks he could improve the game of chess, as Walter Duranty reports him in the Times, by enlarging the board to 100 squares, creating new pieces as powerful as knight and bishop and as rook and bishop combined, putting new premiums on resourcefulness and inventive strategy. His scheme would, of course, scrap all the "books." Capablanca's idea is to make the mere memorizers of the books think out new strategy for themselves.

Senor Capablanca is likely to find it somewhat difficult to revolutionize chess out of hand. The latest innovation, that of castling, dates back to the sixteenth century. If he were determined to alter the game materially he should have started his campaign about the time of the siege of Troy.

THAT JOY OF BATTLE.

W. O. McGeehan, favorably commenting upon George D. Owen, Jun's, frank but surprising statement that, although a star, he never iked football, and neither did many of the players with whom he played, apparently ponders how much real adulterated joy there is in battle. He writes:
