



REPORT CONFIRMED. Paris, Nov. 1.—A despatch from Toulon to the Figaro confirms a report of the return of the entire squadon, and adds that Admiral Caillard's division is still held in readiness to sail at a moment's notice. Editorially the Figaro and other morning papers express surprise at this perplexing and unexplained move after the despatch of Admiral Caillard to the Levant had been officially announced. The Marseilles correspondent of the Matin says the return was due to the fact that the squadron was supplied with only two days' rations.

Washington, Oct. 31.-M. Margerie the charge of the French embassy here, had a short interview with Secretary Hay this afternoon, after which the secretary left at once for the White House. M. Margerie feels con-fident that there is not the slightest danger of a dissolution of the concor dat owing to the action of the French Government in sending warships to make a naval demonstration in Turkish waters and to seize a customs port. The other nations, parties to the concordat, understand the situation perfectly, and in fact most of them have grievances and claims selves, like the French complaints, so they may look with complacency upon the effort to make the Porte meet its obligations. There also is precedent for this action, for a few years ago Austria seized a Turkish port in the Gulf of Alexandria and held it until her claims were paid; yet the incident did not cause protest by the European powers, or even attract much attention. It is confidently expected that it will not be necessary for the French admiral to proceed to any great length before the Turks will meet his






