EXPLOSION IN A MINE

Three Miners Killed and Several Injured at Wilkesbarre, Pa.
WILKESBARRE, Pa., June 23.—An explosion of gas occurred at No. 4 mine of the Susquehanna Coal company this morning, at what manner no one will in all probability ever know. At 8 o'clock last night a gang of men who were engaged in driving a roadway in the mine, entered the tunnel this morning and found that the roadway had been filled with what was supposed to be a mixture of coal dust and gas. The explosion was so powerful that it threw the men who were in the mine several hundred yards and caused the death of three men and the injury of several others.
