## GODARD FACES MURDER CHARGE

Formally Arraigned For Death of Mrs. Crooks At Toronto

REMAINED FOR EIGHT DAYS

Charge Made After Prisoner Identified By Deaf Mute

TORONTO, Jan. 30.—First legal steps towards fastening responsibility for the death of Mrs. Martha Crooks in her home on January 25 on Harold Godard, arrested suspect, were taken by the police authorities to-day when Godard was charged with wilful murder before Magistrate Jones in police court. Without plea or request, the magistrate, at the request of Crown Attorney Murphy, adjourned the hearing for eight days.

Police action, it is said, followed hard on the heels of a statement of a young man, Henry Peacock, a deaf mute, made to the authorities yesterday and subsequently followed Peacock's identification to-day of the accused as the man he had seen leaving the James street house around 10 o'clock last Friday morning.

Peacock's story, as told to the police through an interpreter, was to the effect that he had been engaged in the delivery of hand-bills. As he approached Mrs. Crooks' residence he saw a man coming out of the door. Peacock professed this man a stranger, which was denied. But the youth noticed that the stranger had the collar of his overcoat turned up and that his hands were bloody.

On the following day came a dramatic sequel when he encountered Godard on King street west and recognized him. The mute sought to attract the attention of passers-by, but owing to his affliction he was unable to do any more than make frantic gestures.

This morning the youth was brought to detective headquarters and there brought face to face with Godard. What transpired is closely guarded by the authorities, but immediately afterwards the charge of murder was laid and Godard brought into the court.

## PRINCE VIGGO IS IN A SAD PLIGHT

Does Not Know Whether Or Not He Is Engaged

ARRIVES AT NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—Prince Viggo, of Denmark, cousin of King Christian, of Denmark, and King George, of England, whose engagement to Miss Ellen Green, daughter of J. O. Prince Viggo said he did not want to discuss his reported engagement, but he was perfectly willing to admit, however, that Prince Eric was "officially" engaged, and explained that in order to marry a commoner his brother had necessarily renounced his right of succession to the Danish crown.

He evaded direct reply to a question if he himself had renounced his rights of succession, but said: "I never thought of being a king."

## AFTER RUMMERS ON QUEBEC BORDER

Provincial and State Officials Plan Campaign

WOULD STOP SMUGGLING

Rummers Have Renewed Activities During Last Few Weeks

QUEBEC, Jan. 30.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—Rum-running carried on between this province and the border states is to be checked and the responsibility of this province being a source of liquor for the United States may no longer be impeded to the Province of Quebec if four parties now on between the Quebec liquor authorities are successful in evolving a satisfactory plan of campaign.

A few weeks ago a revival of activities was reported again on the border states. Especially at points south of Pennsylvania County, near Escourt, where forest fires had ravaged the country. Investigations were conducted and the commission advised the American authorities that unless concerted action was arranged the task of preventing illegal exportation of liquor from this province would be very difficult.

It is now the eve of being successfully completed. The Quebec liquor commission will be supported by American revenue men on the border, and, on the other hand, bootleggers entering Canada to escape the United States revenue officers will be dealt with by the Quebec liquor commission inspectors.

## GENERAL BUTLER WARNS POLITICIANS

Declines To Restore Demoted Philadelphia Police Officers

RESENTS INTERFERENCE

Correspondent Says Reported "Clean-Up" Only a Myth

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Jan. 30.—Brig-Gen. Smedley D. Butler, director of public safety, has emerged victorious in his first encounter with a group of politicians who sought to interfere with the work of a police lieutenant demoted because of alleged inefficiency during the director's latest offensive against vice and crime.

In his terse and emphatic manner Gen. Butler yesterday told the politicians that he was boss of the police and that any sign of political interference would result immediately in his resignation and return to the Marine Corps.

At a conference with Mayor Kendrick regarding the matter, the general announced to-day that he had up-announced his resignation.

"There are still numerous disorderly houses in the various sections of the city," he affirms. "There are still hundreds of saloons, and a record of murder, robbery, burglary and other offenses in the criminal category eats up large jobs of space in the newspapers daily."
