



He is already putting into operation a plan to set up small industries with motor car production in smalle towns and even viliages, where farmers, now unemployed through the winter months could use the time to their own profit. Mr. Ford forsee the day when both horses and cows are done away with. Milk will be produced from the same cereals the cow eats, and will be superior to the natural article and much cleaner. A scientific food will take the place of beef, while small motor engines will replace horses on the farm. "The cow" he said "is the crudest machine in the world." The Chicago Tribune publishes a full- page advertisment in various United States newspapers extolling its own enterprise in the Province of Ontario. The information is of special interest to Ontario people.

"Six hundred and sixty-five tons

"This great mill represents an in-vestment of millions of dollars, and employs 650 men."

This is excellent publicity for Ontario's natural resources and industrial development, but it prompts the question. How long can the Province continue to keep pulp and paper mills in operation and United States newspapers supplied with paper unless its palpwood growth is replen-

ished? If one edition of a Sunday newspaper eats up 54 acres of Ontario timber, how soon will all the newspapers printed on Ontario-made paper eat up all the timber ?

In Quebec some of the pulp and paper companies are planting a tree special interest to Ontario people.
