Quebec, Feb. 24.
Another Fire.—The citizens of Quebec
were again alarmed, between one and two
o'clock, this morning, by the alarm of fire.—
The alarm was raised in consequence of the
new wooden house on the St. Lewis Road,
near the Race Course, owned and occupied
by Mr. Garrett Murphy, farmer, being dis-
covered to be on fire. The police were
promptly on the spot and rendered all the as-
sistance in their power, but the fire had at-
tained too much head to render any attempt
at extinguishing it of avail. The house was,
consequently totally consumed, together with
the greater part of the furniture. The house
being isolated the fire did not extend its rav-
ages, and no accident, we understand, occur-
ed.

From the Saint John Chronicle.
ON CATHOLIC AFFAIRS.
A meeting of the Catholics of Saint John
was convened after Vespers in Friary Hall, on
Sunday evening the 25th ult. at the request
of the select Committee for Catholic affairs,
for the purpose of taking into consideration
the language set forth by the Rev. Mr. Dun-
phy from the Pulpit in St. Malachy's Church
in this city, on Sunday, viz:
"That Father Frensch was not authori-
zed to officiate in this Diocese—that his
papers from the Court of Rome were in-
sufficient." He at the same time forbidding
the congregation therein assembled to attend
his (the Rev. Mr. Frensch's) mass or vespers.
Moreover Mr. Dunphy declared that the doc-
ument produced by Mr. Frensch to say mass
was not signed by His Holiness the Pope,
nor by the Secretary of the Sacred Congre-
gation of the Propaganda Fide. Further,
that some of Mr. Dunphy's partisans repeat-
ed and said that documents were nothing
but a forgery."
Therefore it was entered into by the meet-
ing, that the Rev. Mr. Frensch's papers should
be minutely examined by James Paterson,
Esq., principal of the Grammar School, who
is an acknowledged gentleman and profound
scholar; and on investigation thereof, if they
be not found genuine, the Catholics shall
quit attending the Rev. Mr. Frensch's service,
but on the contrary, if the documents in
question, be found genuine, and emanating
from the head of Catholic Church, Pope Gre-
gory the sixteenth, then the Catholic com-
munity herein assembled, shall bend submis-
sion to such authority, and flock round our
beloved minister and support him against
such false imputations.
Accordingly several gentlemen of the Cath-
olic Church waited on Mr. Paterson to ex-
amine Mr. Frensch's documents and report
thereon. Mr. Frensch produced the docu-
ments received at Rome of which the follow-
ing are the contents thereof:
Document No. 1, is a grant of his Holiness
Pope Gregory the sixteenth to Rev. Father
C. D. Frensch of the order of Preachers, to
institute a College in St. John, N. B. and to
be placed under the auspices of the Propa-
ganda Fide, and of the Bishop of Charlotte
Town, wherein young men of ecclesiastical
vocation shall pursue their studies, and enjoy
the same privileges as those which have been
granted to the College of Corpo Sancto in
Lisbon, capital of Portugal.
Document No. 2, is the Sovereign Pontif-
cal express granted to the Rev. C. D. Frensch,
a Licence to celebrate the Divine Mysteries
throughout New Brunswick, together with
many other privileges.
Document No. 3—is the Letter of the Most
Illustrious, the most Eminent, and the most
Rev. Lord Cardinal Fransonicus, Prefect of
the Propaganda Fide.
To the Right Rev. Donald McDonald, Bishop
of Charlotte Town, viz:
"Rev. Father Charles Dominicus Frensch,
of the order of Preachers, returning to Amer-
ica and to your Diocese, asked me to recom-
mend him by letter to your Lordship. Al-
though the exertions of this worthy clergy-
man, Rev. C. D. Frensch, viz: in promoting
the good of the Catholic religion—in labour-
ing for the salvation of souls—in erecting
temples for the increase of God's worship, are
perfectly sufficient for your Lordship to re-
ceive him with kindness, and treat him with
all the benignity of your good disposition—
nevertheless I most earnestly recommend him
to you again and again in the strongest terms.
His arrival amongst you will bring many ad-
vantages to the diocese of Charlotte Town,
for the enterprise he has engaged in will be
very useful in religion. It was highly ap-
proved of by the sacred congregation. There-
fore I trust you will afford him every assis-
tance and co-operation in your power to
further the laudable institution.
Wishing your Lordship a long life and a
happy end.

seal with which they are accompanied, to be
true and valid documents.
