

DARING TRIP IN A SMALL YAWL

Yachtsmen Well Known in Nova Scotia Set Sail From Baddeck for Cowes, England.

There set sail from Baddeck Saturday midnight for Cowes, England, the forty five foot auxiliary yawl Typhoon, manned by Frederick W. Baldwin, better known as "Casey Baldwin", of Baddeck; William Wallace Nutting, yachtsman and editor of the Motor Boat Magazine, New York and James Dorset, mechanic. Baddeck which was built by Dr. Alexander Graham Bell's staff at his wonderful home of science "Befn Brough," is about the size of the late Captain Josh Stocum's famous yacht in which he crossed the Atlantic some years ago. The Typhoon is forty five feet long, twelve feet beam, displaces about twelve tons, and has a seven and a half horsepower Diesel crude oil engine. She will make six to seven knots per hour in fair wind and weather.

The three daring navigators expect to reach England in twenty two days. They sailed from Baddeck for St. Pierre, Miquelon. It was then their plan to sail from the French islands direct to the Irish coast, a distance of nineteen hundred and fifty miles. The yacht carries two fresh water distillers, the latest invention of Dr. Graham Bell, who publicly presented them to the Typhoon at a farewell reception given her crew at Baddeck on Saturday.

On arrival at Cowes, the great English yachting centre, the Typhoon will be changed to sloop rig and will enter the races there. She sails under the British flag and in the races will fly the burgee of the Brass D'or Yacht Club, of which Mr. Nutting, the owner is an honorary life member.

Both Messrs Baldwin and Nutting are very well known to Halifax yachtsmen. Mr. Baldwin, who is Dr. Bell's right hand man at Baddeck, has always been known as a yachting expert. His little R class boat "Scraper II" successfully competed for the Coronation Cup the blue ribbon trophy of the Maritimes until in 1912 the Gem, of Halifax, captured it from the Scraper. Last year Mr. Baldwin took the Scraper all the way from Baddeck to Chester to compete for the Coronation cup there. He did not lift it, but Chester gave him a royal reception, as being a real yachtsman and a true sportsman.

William Wallace Nutting came to Halifax in 1912 in the odd looking little sloop "Nereis", which he sailed single handed all the way from the United States to this port. He was made a guest of honor at the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron and after a week's stay here sailed for St. Pierre, Miquelon to which port he successfully navigated the Nereis.

Nova Scotia yachtsmen will wish the crew of the Typhoon bon voyage on this their latest and most spectacular voyage.

Mr. Nutting, is well known in Digby having accompanied Geo Bonnell from New York to that port on board the little power launch Old Glove II in 1916 and was present at the ladies' day outing under the auspices of the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club which received a big write up in the Motor Boat Magazine this giving Digby a splendid advertisement as a popular summer resort.

ACCIDENT NEAR YARMOUTH

Health Caravan Suffers Serious Loss Thru Fire

YARMOUTH, July 23—The Nova Scotia Red Cross health caravan, in charge of Dr. Douglas, arrived in Yarmouth shortly after noon today, and after a brief stop proceeded to Tusket. When about half way between that village and Yarmouth the Ford gorry took fire and was practically destroyed. The Delco lighting system used for the moving pictures and illustrated lecture was on this lorry and was totally ruined, as was also four reels of films. Fortunately, however, the outfit has these reels in duplicate, and consequently that loss is not so serious. It is supposed the fire started from a short circuit in the mechanism of the car. Studley, the driver, was somewhat stung, but beyond that no one was injured.

FAREWELL SERVICE FOR MISS KEANS

Park Memorial Church Sews Another Star on Service Flag.

The Missionary service flag of Park Memorial Baptist Church, Springfield, Mass., had another large white star sewed on to the red background during an impressive farewell service in recognition of Miss Lena A. Keans, a former school teacher in that city, who will leave for South India in October to take up educational work under the Woman's Baptist Foreign Missionary Board.

Miss Keans was introduced to the several hundred persons who filled the auditorium by Rev. C. H. Leggett, superintendent of Springfield Rescue Mission, who preached a farewell service during the exercises. The missionary described briefly her reasons for going to the foreign field and her preparation in this country in Gordon Bible College in Boston.

After telling of the urgent need for educational workers in the institutions that are being maintained throughout the East and of the different phases of work she intends to take up on her arrival in India, Miss Keans said that she was fulfilling her desire that had been felt for a number of years and that she believed it would be impossible for her to allow discomfort and sacrifice to interfere with what she considers was meant to be her life work.

STEPS NECESSARY

Comparing missionary work to that of a jeweler's and the Christianization of the world to the cutting and polishing of stones after they have been secured from a mine, Rev. Mr. Leggett in a sermon on "Jewels" said that there were three steps in the work of a missionary and ministers at home that were necessary before the work of the church would be completed.

Men and women, he said, must first be found in much the same way that precious stones are picked up after careful investigation. They must then be cleaned so that they can be more easily prepared for a setting and then cut and polished. The work of a missionary, he said, consisted in securing jewels in the shape of men's lives in foreign fields.

PRESENTED PURSE

At the close of the sermon Miss Keans received a purse from members of the church and an embossed book, in which were written the names of her friends, together with a few telling remarks beside each signature.

Her remarks, together with a few telling of their appreciation of her work and the purpose that prompted her to go into the field.

A musical program included several solos and a special number by Evelyn and Elinor Harris, two girls who have been active in the Sunday school of the church and who have known Miss Keans for some time. Another special number was sung by Mrs. Elwood Stewart during the adding of a white star to the service flag.

The service closed with a benediction by Rev. Mr. Leggett.

There are now two stars on the flag. In December of last year, Miss Hazel E. Barney, another one of the members went to Western China under the auspices of the China Inland Mission and is now working in one of the compounds. A young man from the church entered Colgate Theological Seminary to train for the ministry last year and two other members are now in training for Christian work in the Moody Bible Institute in Chicago.

Miss Keans is the daughter of Capt. and Mrs. Edward Keans, of Port Wade and has many friends in this country who will join the MONITOR in wishing her every success.
