A CONSTITUTION FOR POLAND.—The Patric reports that the Emperor of Russia has resolved to grant a constitution to Poland, and to place it on a similar footing to that which Hungary stands in with regard to the Austrian empire.

The following letter has been received from St Petersburgh, dated the 28th of December:-

"I am enabled to contradict a report circulated in the German papers as to the mobilization of the Rus-sian troops in the south of Poland. No order has been given, nor has there been any preparations made to justify that announcement. The Emperor has merely inspected his Guard. The Minister for Foreign Affairs consults the Emperor every day, while the Council of the Empire is actively occupied with the plan for the emancipation of the serfs, and with the revision of the present system of taxation. The commission appointed to prepare a plan for the abolition of the brandy monopoly, which produces a revenue of 400,000,000f, annually for the Government, proposes to replace the monopoly by a duty on ardent spirits. The reports received from the Governors-General of Wassiltchikoff, Nasimow, and Warsaw are filled with complaints relative to the agitation which prevails in Volbynia, Podolia, the Ukraine, Lithuania, and Poland. This agitation, it is said, is encouraged by emissaries from Gallicia."

NANA SAHIB STILL ALIVE.—This intelligence is communicated from Calcutta by the Times' corres-

"CALCUTTA, Nov. 28 .- The most important announcement that I can make in this letter is this, that the Nana Sabib is still living. He is encamped with four thousand followers in Thibet, just beyond the Nepaul frontier, and in a country over which Jung Bahudoor can claiming supremacy. He has plenty of money, and is able to subsist his followers without committing depredations on the villagers. He is thus not only tolerated but cherished, and the inhabitants have aided him in his attempt to conceal the fact of his existence from the authorities. Up to the month of August last, not a doubt remained on the minis of any one as to the fate of the Nana. It was believed that he had died of a fever in the jungles. This was asserted by his fellow rebels and by every one who had an opportunity of inquiring into the matter. The statement was accepted far and wide. His former retainers of Bithoor believed it, and two of his wives left behind in Hindostan, showed their faith in the rumor by performing that religious ceremony which constitutes them rerevocably widows. Yet all this time the Nana-Bala Rao, his brother, Deoi Bukah, his commander, in-chief, were alive and at the head of an army of some thousands of men, with elephants in abundance, and some 30 field pieces. From the statement furnished by a native who has just escaped from their camp, it appears that they moved north-wards into the hills, and marched fifteen days di-rectly onwards without halting. Before doing this, each of the chiefs cut off the little finger of his right right, and caused funeral obsequies to be perthe usual signs of mourning were made, and it appeared to all not in the secret, that it was actually the Chief who was thus disposed of. The rumov of this occurrence speedily spread, and was everywhere believed. It was under cover of this ruse that the Nana and his party moved into the hills. After marching fifteen days, they came upon the mountains which separate Nepaul from Thibet. They moved beyond these to a little town called Thoowaria, where, at the time of the escape of the informant (inst August) they were encamped. Of their manner of life, and of the resolution at which our Government has arrived, I have spoken above. It is possible, however, that the matter may not rest here. Sir Hugh Rose is on his way to Goruckpore, our frontier station in the direction of the Nepalese and Thibet hills. He will there have opportunity of con-versing with the escaped native, and of comparing his statement with others which I am sure have since been received, as to the nature of the locality, and its facility of access to the plains. A deadly enemy, having at his disposal some 4,000 or 5,000 men, and 30 gaus, might commit for the moment terrible depredations. Although the Nana will, if he knows his interest, keep quiet, it would be unwise to leave any portion of our frontier to tempt his inroads, and this, you may be well assured, Sir Hugh Rose will


