Community Co-ordinators at Posts Abroad. The program has finally been approved. A telex will announce it and a circular document will follow to provide information on its scope, its objectives, the selection of candidates, contract procedures and other details. During its implementation in 1984-85 and 1985-86, a close monitoring process will be put into effect in order to evaluate the program and then report to senior management on a full scale implementation for 1986-87.

Spousal Employment Policy. All the comments from the various divisions of the Department, as well as outside the Department, were incorporated into the draft document which was presented to the Departmental Human Resources Planning Committee on October 3, 1984. The Committee approved the draft document, so later this month it will be presented to the Executive Committee composed of all the Assistant Deputy Ministers and chaired by Mr. Massé.

Spousal Employment Profiles. In order to fully identify the knowledge and skills of foreign service spouses, your employment profiles are very much needed. Language Classes. Our language classes have been active this year (fiscal year 1983-84). According to the statistics just tabulated: 201 employees and 80 spouses participated in preposting language programs, approximately the same number continued their training upon arrival at post, 103 employees and seven spouses were on developmental foreign language training programs and 11 employees and two spouses have been taking the intensive one year language training program.

Any employee who wishes to take foreign language training outside normal working hours at a recognized institution here in Ottawa, or at post, could be reimbursed 100% or 50% of the fees (depending on the particular case). If you are interested, complete the Training and Development Authorization Form TBS/SCT 330-179 and send it to the Foreign Language Section.

POSTING OPERATIONS AND TRAINING SECTION


