government together with the commission and the city of Toronto will shortly move in this matter. It is not only of importance to Spadina but to the whole metropolitan area.

I would estimate that the two largest national groups in my riding are the Italian and the Hungarian. The section of College street between Bathurst and Grace is affectionately called "Little Italy" and on the side streets north and south of College many immigrants make their own "vino" as they did back home. For this purpose they import grapes from California by the carload. After visiting many of these hospitable homes one becomes impressed with the money and effort that has been put into improving their interiors and their furnishings. In many homes and backyards there are plants and gardens that are reminiscent of the walled estates of Italy, only on a smaller scale.

Spadina has since the year 1956 probably been the largest reception area in Canada for immigrating Hungarians, Serbs, Slovenians and Croations. The freedom fighters and those who followed them have taken to their adopted land with enthusiasm and are noticeably eager to acquire citizenship. For them the most popular man in this country is the former minister of citizenship and immigration who is now the Secretary of State for Canada (Mr. Pickersgill). They are most appreciative of his efforts on their behalf when he went to Austria in 1956 to assist their entry here. In fact, if I want to raise a cheer in some audiences I find I simply have to mention the name of the Hon. J. W. Pickersgill. May I call it six o'clock?
