MEMBERS' EXPENSES

Mr. Guy St-Julien (Abitibi): Mr. Speaker, last week, acting on behalf of the Board of Internal Economy, you tabled the report of the Auditor General on the audit of the House of Commons administration.

On the whole, the report is quite positive about the administration of the House. However, the Auditor General had several comments on members' expenses. For instance, an allowance of 64 travel points is not much of an incentive for restraint. Telecommunications are another major area where there is very little incentive to cut down.

Every year the House publishes in the Public Accounts a statement of the indemnities, allowances and travel expenses of members of the House of Commons, but this represents only 37 per cent of members' expenditures. According to the report, there should be greater public disclosure of members' expenditures.
