The greatest racing meet for running and trotting horses that has ever been held in Canada opened at the Hamilton Jockey Club track on Saturday and was continued yesterday with success beyond expectations. must have given them much satisfaction.

MR. HENDRIE AND THE O. J. C. Mr. William Hendrie, of this city, president of the Ontario Jockey Club, has addressed the shareholders in a circular, in which he very clearly sets out his position in connection with the trouble in the club. The letter is as Iollows:

To the Shareholders of the Ontario Jockey Club:

Genthemen,—I stated when acknowledging receipt of the letter addressed to me by Messra. Patteson and Mead, that I would deal with meaning mead the shareholders are being in October. Since then, however, I find that persistent efforts are being made to mislead the shareholders of the club, and to create a prejudice against me in the public mind by charging me with litentions that exist only in the prolific imaginations of my detractors. The most important charge is that in consequence—of my residence being in consequence—of my residence being in thamilton I am unfit to be President of the club. Permit me to remind original shareholders that the Ontario Jockey Club was formed as a provincial club not as a sectional one, and that it has alsways maintained that characteristic since its inception until now, and I have always and at all times done everything im my power to forward its interests and uphold its provincial character.

THE QUEN'S HORSES SOLD.

London, July 2.—The Queen's breeding stud was sold on Saturdar by Messrs. Tattersall without reserve. Every brood mare, yearling and foal, as well as the stallions of the royal stud were sold. The reasons for this sale are unknown, and have caused the more surprise, as it is well known that Her Majesty's stock has paid its way. There was an immense at tendance; most of the foreign Governments were represented. The catalogue of the sale showed that there was a total of 78 lots. Of these 30 were yearlings, 45 were, brood mares and foals, and three stallions. The most valuable mare was Wedlock, a ten-year-old, and dam of Best Man, last year's best handicap horse. Wedlock brought 4,600 guineas. She was purchased by Baron Hirsch. Sir James Millerrapaid 2,000 guineas for Sand, dam of Sainfoin, Golden Garter and Vetch, by Wenlo, out of Sand. Arthur-James paid 1,040 guineas for a filly by Bend Or, out of Luciennes. The total realized by the sale was 23,070 guineas. Mr. Robertson, however, is here on a pleasure trip and refused to make any concession.
