
POPE PIUS CELEBRATES.




Woolen Mills Burned,

HOTEL WAITER KILLS CHILD. Guelph, Aug. 9 .- At five o'clock this

Cincinnati, Aug. 9.—Thomas Mc-Kenna, an hotel waiter, after throw-ing his three-year-old child from a third storey window of his home to-day, jumped out too. The child was killed instantly.
