

BOER'S BOMBAST

P. Louter Wessels, Special Commissioner to the United States, Tells About Kruger's Plans.

EX-PRESIDENT HAS A COMMISSION, INTERESTED IN A CONTROVERSY

But just what it is the Envoys have not learned—There May Be a Huge Rebellion.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Oct. 12.—(Special.)—The South African Republic to the United States, yesterday received a letter from Secretary of State, Mr. Taft, containing the plans of ex-President Kruger that has been made public. The letter states that President Kruger will leave Delagoa Bay on the 15th inst. and will be in the Netherlands by the 16th. He will be taken to Holland, where the powers are waiting him.

Might Arouse the Dutchmen.
In regard to the intention in British newspapers that English warships might be sent in pursuit, Mr. Wessels said that any such action by Great Britain would be accepted by the Netherlands as a direct declaration of war, and that the Dutch government would not accordingly.

Ex-President Kruger bears a commission from the Boer republic, but exactly what it is even the envoys of the Boer republic do not know. They suppose, however, that he will endeavor to secure intervention by one or all of the European powers to the end that the independence of the republic shall not be annihilated.

A Great Big Rebellion!
Mr. Wessels, in his interview, stated that the representations of large numbers of Boers immigrating to America were unfounded. He said: "You need not be surprised if there is a rebellion of the Boers in South Africa before the year is out. The only reason the Cape Colonists did not join in the rebellion was because they had no arms, and neither they nor we expected war and were surprised."

THE MONTREAL WITNESSES

\$10,000 FOR SENATORSHIP

Mr. H. H. Cook, ex-M.P., Gives Some Nice Information by Wire to a North Grey Man

INTERESTED IN A CONTROVERSY

Which Arose Over Dr. Horsey's Speech—Mr. Cook Says Price Was Too High—The Story.

Owen Sound, Oct. 12.—(Special.)—The campaign in North Grey is going along right merrily. The other night at a public meeting Dr. Horsey, Liberal candidate, referring to H. H. Cook's letter in Wednesday's World, said that Mr. Cook was a disgruntled Liberal, because he had not got a seat in the House of Commons. Mr. Tucker Asked If It Was True.
H. G. Tucker, barrister of Owen Sound, who has been following Dr. Horsey on the platform, on Thursday wired Mr. Cook, asking if Dr. Horsey's statement was true. Mr. Cook replied by the following telegram, that speaks for itself:

Toronto, Oct. 11, 1900.
To H. G. Tucker, Esq., Owen Sound:
My dear Sir, I never asked Horsey to assist me in getting a seat in the House of Commons. I was an up-lifter, but when offered one the price was too high.

\$10,000 Was Asked.
This telegram was not definite enough for Mr. Tucker, and he yesterday telephoned Mr. Cook and asked: "At what price was the seat offered?"

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Tucker received the following telegram from Mr. Cook in answer to his telephone query:

Toronto, Oct. 12, 1900.
To H. G. Tucker, Esq., Owen Sound:
Price demanded for Senatorship was \$10,000.

It is currently reported that Mr. Cook has in his possession letters that reveal the fact that vacant seats in the Senate were used by the present Administration as a means of holding up Liberals whose years of service for the party entitled them to recognition.

True He Was an Applicant.

It is true that Mr. Cook was an applicant for a Senatorship. The story runs that one day after his application was made he received word from a prominent official at Ottawa to meet him at the Union Station. Mr. Cook took with him a letter from the Governor of the Province, stating that if Mr. Cook handed over to the Government the letter, the Senatorship was his. The official also declared that another offer was being considered in which the applicant bid \$10,000. Mr. Cook turned the proposition with becoming dignity, and withdrew his application.

No Second Chance to Buy It.
In the following year, however, another vacancy occurred, and Mr. Cook again made application. The said official was written to Mr. Cook and told him that, as Mr. Cook had been given one opportunity to reject the offer, he was not to be considered for a second time. Mr. Cook has now in his possession.

The first letter was never in Mr. Cook's possession, and unfortunately the official is dead. Yet Mr. Cook and three of his friends are prepared to swear to the truth of the story.

It is considered just possible that the interesting correspondence that Mr. Cook has will be made public and used as campaign literature in North Grey.

THE WISCONSIN A GOOD 'UN.

Another Warship Turned Out for Uncle Sam's Navy, and She Breaks a Record.

Santa Barbara, Cal., Oct. 12.—The Wisconsin has just completed the most successful trial trip ever made by a battleship in this country, and she is pronounced the finest vessel ever turned out by the Union Iron Works, which built the Oregon. The big vessel gained a maximum speed of 18.4 knots per hour and maintained an average speed of 17.25 knots per hour. The only other battleship approaching this speed is the Alabama, which averaged 17.01 knots and attained a maximum speed of 18.03.

Grand Chief Powell Fired.

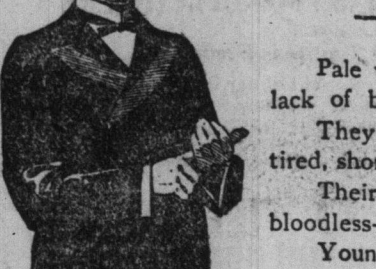
Order of Railway Telegraphers Gave Their President the "G. B." After a Trial.
