If it were dec to grant them to a private company, surely the commonest prudence would have suggested that the government should retain the most absolute control over the rates to be charged consumers, and in order to arrive at a knowledge of what the rate should be, it would be necessary to know what was the actual investment in the enterprise, not the watered investment, with which we are too familiar. If any of these precautions were taken we have not heard of them.

In other words the Liberal or Ross government failed in exercising the commonest prudence in dealing with these private power corporations.

This company is to take over the assets of a smaller company of the same owners previously organized.
