## Shot Himself In the Eye.

Geo. Cook, ex-Chief of Police of Paris, Attempted Suicide

In His Bedroom at the Bernard House -He Made a "Mull of It, 'He Says-No Cause Ascribed for the Rash Act-He Will Recover.

George Cook, well known throughout Western Ontario, shot himself in the House, in this city, at 11:20 this morn-

George Cook is about 45 or 50 years of age, and heavy build, and came originally from Waterloo county. At the latter place he also engaged in the hotel business, where he conducted a saloon for about four years. He was at one time an applicant for a position on the London police force.
