The war with the United States deprived her of Porto Rico, Cuba, the Philippines and the Island of Guam, or a total area of 160,601 square miles. All that is left of the great empire of Charles V. and Philip II. is the peninsula of Spain and 243,877 square miles in Africa.

In it spectacular and romantic decadence and its marvelous demonstration of incapacity for colonial government, history furnishes no parallel to the vanishing Spanish Empire.—The Times-Herald, Chicago.

History of the Decline and Fall of a Once Great Empire.

It is the closing chapter in the history of the decline and fall of an empire whose flag was once mistress of the seas. The colonial history of Spain is the most thrilling narrative in annals of Europe.
