BASEBALL

While the London fans are still reeling in baseball with the entire team on the payroll, the Hamilton officials are rejoicing at having jockeyed the season to an early close. Two games were played yesterday at Tecumseh Park between the London and the Detroit Athletic Club. About 300 people witnessed the morning game, and the attendance was about 600 in the afternoon. In the days when London had a semi-professional team here, the D. A. C. were looked upon as worthy opponents, but it was clearly shown yesterday that the home team, as at present constituted, is altogether too fast for the visitors. The one run which the latter made in the morning was due to a wild throw to first by Frank, in an effort to complete a double play. Only one other chance to score was allowed, and then the runner was out off at the plate. The game was too one-sided to be interesting. Remarkable catches by Jones, Hemphill and Snow were redeeming features.

A FOURTEEN-INNING TIE GAME.
Yesterday morning, at 10:30 o'clock, the Oregon and Rumbler ball teams, east end rivals, began to play on the Queen's Park diamond and at 2:30 in the afternoon the game stood a tie in the fourteenth inning—19 to 19. AQUATIC.

A BLUNDER—NO RACE.

Toronto, Aug. 21.—The first day's racing for the Canada's cup was to have taken place today, but although the Genesee and Beaver started at the appointed hour, there was no race, as neither yacht sailed the appointed course. The Beaver, the Canadian boat, met with an accident a few seconds after the start, and within three minutes' start of the race was on her way back to harbor in a crippled state. There was lots of wind for the Genesee to cover the course in the appointed time of 5% hours, and most of the spectators took it for granted that she would do so. A blunder on the part of the helmsman threw away the grand opportunity, however. For the first three or four miles the Genesee held in the right place, but then she steered away to the east, never approaching within three miles of the westerly buoy, and finished without sailing the first buoy of the triangle at all. The Genesee crossed the line first at 11:30:12. The Beaver crossed at 11:30:14, just two seconds behind her competitor, but to windward, and in a better position than the Genesee. The Beaver was rapidly forging ahead, when the pennant carrying the throat halyard block parted. This allowed the mainsail to drop, and the strain being more than the spreader could bear, caused it to bend almost double. The Beaver was then out of the race, and taking in her mainsail, made for port under a jib until taken in town by a steam launch. After holding on for three miles on the right track, the Genesee altered her course, and went away off to the eastward. It subsequently turned out that she had expected the steam yacht Pathfinder to show her the westerly buoy, but the latter went to the easterly buoy instead, and the Genesee followed suit. Afterwards the American boat returned to the starting point. The judges declared there had been no race, and the Genesee accordingly loses the first match by her blunder. The Beaver will be in ship-shape again tomorrow, and the racing will begin at 11 o'clock.

GETTING THE CHALLENGER READY.

New York, Aug. 21.—The cup challenger Shamrock was towed from her anchorage off Tompkinsville, Staten Island, this morning, to the Erie Basin. The Erin left her anchorage before the races to get everything in readiness for Shamrock's arrival at the basin. The challenger will be drydocked and thoroughly scraped, and will have her racing spars and gear put in as soon as possible. The racing spars and gear came over on a liner, and the ship will rig her will come from the other side. The Erin was warped into a drydock. The Shamrock was moored to a pier south of the drydock, and her crew began transferring her sea stores to the tender Nonowauk.

CAPT PARKER CAN'T ASSIST.
