### NEWPORT FALLS ON PRINCE

Wilhelm Flees Society Function to Attend Sailors' Dance.

Newport, R. I., Aug. 25.—A certain small section of Newport voiced its horror this morning, and the rest expressed approval, when it became known that the early disappearance of Prince Wilhelm of Sweden from the dinner given by Mrs. Ogden Mills last night was due to his democratic instincts, which sent him to the dance given by the Swedes of this city for the sailors on his cruiser, the Flygia.

Fully an hour before social form and royal custom required his departure, the prince rose, and, accompanied by Baron de Laegerantz, the Swedish minister at Washington, hurried to the dance hall, where he entered into the fun with such zest that as the night advanced, Baron de Laegerantz was obliged to remind him of his royal dignity.

When the floor was cleared for dancing his highness watched until he could keep quiet no longer. Jumping down on the floor, he placed his royal arm about the trim waist of Miss Gerda Swenson and joined the dancers. After that the prince danced with half the girls in the room.

Prince Wilhelm of Sweden has diplomatically requested Ogden Mills, Stuyvesant Fish, Peabody Winslow and others of his entertainers at Newport not to introduce highballs or champagne at functions at which he is invited.

The prince is abstemious in all his requirements, and on his own ship he never encourages the use of wine, although it is placed on the tables for guests who enjoy it.

### WANTS TWO GRIZZLIES

Chinese Empress Is Accumulating a Most Comprehensive Menagerie.

Seattle, Aug. 25.—Stephen Mason, old hunter and trapper known all over the west as one of the most remarkable shots, has just received an unusual commission at the hands of the Empress Dowager of China, for her son, the emperor. Through a fur company of this place Mason is to capture a pair of real live grizzly bears and four equally alive wildcats.

The empress is accumulating an imperial museum of the world's famous, and fast disappearing, animals, and is to include in the collections the above named species. Mason will endeavor to fill the order in the wilds of the Cascade Mountains, near the Canadian International line.

Several months ago a Seattle firm sent three buffalo and a case of cougars to her majesty, and Canadian shippers consigned numerous specimens from the north part of the continent.

It is said the Chinese empress is endeavoring to acquire the menagerie that her subjects may know of the animals of all the earth.

### ROADHOUSE IN COURT

Refuses to Answer and May Be Charged With Contempt.

North Bay, Aug. 25.—Robert Roadhouse, with Arthur Rodly and a man named McGuire, appeared before Thomas Bonurke, the local magistrate, to answer to an injunction to compel them from interfering with the men at the mines. The men refused to answer many of the questions put to them, and a motion to commit them for contempt of court was raised. This will be heard Tuesday.

### A LUNATIC AT LARGE

He Has a Revolver and Is Out After Revenge.

Toronto, Aug. 26.—The police of Toronto Junction are searching for Henry James Bagnell, the man who escaped from the Mimico asylum, stole a boat from J. M. Godfrey, at Port Credit, and was blown across the lake to near Port Dalhousie, whence he disappeared, after being revived by Rev. L. H. Thomas and others who dragged the boat ashore.

Bagnell is supposed to be armed with a revolver, and looking for those who were instrumental in having him put in the asylum. It is said that he was able to borrow money from friends, and with it purchased the revolver.

He has been living for the past few days with Mr. T. A. Tutty, of 177 Clendenen avenue, but left there on Saturday.

Bagnell was arrested on a charge of beating his wife, and so severe were her injuries that the authorities thought that he was insane. Doctors were called in and found him insane, and he was sent to the asylum.

He is said to be very bitter over being locked up, and may go to extreme measures. Before he left Port Credit Mr. Godfrey's boat he secured a big knife from a summer cottage.

## FOR PERMANENT ARBITRATION

The U. S. Submits Amendments to the Original Draft.

The Hague, Aug. 26.—At this afternoon's session of the committee charged with examining the obligatory arbitration proposals, General Horace Porter announced that the American delegation had received new instructions to present a special list of cases coming within the scope of the proposed scheme.

Similar lists will be presented by Great Britain and Portugal. The question of obligatory arbitration entered today upon a definite phase as a result of the new American proposition, which was worked out, drafted and presented by Gen. Horace Porter, of the American delegation, to the peace conference, and approved by Washington. Except for this American move the Austrian proposition, which practically postpones the question, and which also was presented today, would certainly have been adopted.

The first two articles of the new proposition are the same as in the original draft, which was presented on July 9. These provide that the permanent court of arbitration is to be constituted and composed of fifteen judges, chosen by the different countries to serve for ten years (the number of years left blank), until their successors are appointed; that the court is to sit at The Hague; that it will establish its own rules, and that all decisions are to be taken by a majority vote, nine members to compose a quorum.

The new third article covers the following cases:

The difference regarding the interpretation of the stipulations in the matter of customs tariffs, the measurement of ships, the consideration of foreigners as citizens so far as taxation is concerned, and the right of foreigners to buy and possess property, as well as the differences regarding the interpretation and the application of the following conventions: For the international protection of works, concerning railways, means to prevent collisions at sea, literary and artistic copyright, rules of commercial and industrial companies, weights and measures, reciprocal free assistance for poor patients, the conventions regarding boards of health, international private law, and civil and penal procedure. This article covers also the differences regarding pecuniary claims about damages when the principle of indemnity is admitted by the parties concerned.

Article No. 3 in the original draft becomes article No. 4 in the new draft and recites that in all cases the parties expressly consent thereto, can a judge participate in the consideration or decision of a matter brought before the court in which his own country is concerned.

By the fifth article it is understood that the stipulations admitting obligatory arbitration under special conditions in treaties already concluded, or to be concluded, remain in force.

The sixth article says that the provisions of article 3 cannot in any case be claimed in cases of the interpretation and application of extra territorial rights.

Article 4 of the original draft, which declares the court shall be competent to take cognizance of and determine all cases regarding differences of an international character between sovereign states which cannot be settled through diplomacy, becomes article 7 in the new draft, and article 6 of the original, which declares that the present permanent court of arbitration may, so far as possible, contribute to the formation of the basis of the new court, becomes, with the addition of minor details, article 8 of the new draft.

It is supposed that the Austrian proposition was presented on behalf of Germany after the receipt of instructions by Herr Krieger, of the German delegation, who went to Berlin three days ago as one of them.

### NICE FOR GAYNOR.

Macon, Ga., Aug. 26.—The United States circuit court of appeals has ordered Col. John F. Gaynor, under sentence for the Savannah harbor frauds, and in jail here, pending appeal, to be allowed to visit Indian Springs for the benefit of his health, which is falling under confinement.

Col. Gaynor will be accompanied to the springs by two deputy sheriffs and will bear the expenses of the trip. The change is necessary, Col. Gaynor's physicians say, to preserve his life. Col. Gaynor will leave for the springs as 8 o'clock tomorrow morning. The order of the court is with the concurrence of Attorney-General Bonaparte.

## SHAW'S THEORY AS TO "REFORMS"

Discusses Diet, Politics, Matrimony and Manners,

### AND BASIS FOR A NEW PARTY

Abandons Labor Organization and Would Now Push "Ex-Gentlemen" to Front.

London, Aug. 26.—Nothing makes George Bernard Shaw so furious as casting doubt upon the efficacy of his vegetarian diet. "I want about an hour and a half of navying every day to work off my steam," he says, "and as society is organized to suit the boozing people I can't get in. The consequence is the steam accumulates, gets stale and poisonous and finally explodes about once a month in a devastating headache. No avoidance of uric acid food helps one in the least."

"I cannot play games because I never bring myself to care whether I win or lose. Consequently I spoil the games for my players. I never play anything well."

"What I want is a job of manual work, thinning a jungle for preference, but whitewashing not objected to."

**Three Meals One Too Many.** "I don't touch tobacco, spirits, tea, coffee, cocoa, flesh or fowl. I take three meals a day and grow more and more convinced that three is one too much. I don't eat, not drop one, as I am a married man and not let do what I like."

"I practice at 8 o'clock in the morning simple gymnastics with a couple of chairs for twenty to thirty seconds, which keeps my waist limp."

"Though a lazy man, I have got the work done rather badly and get unhappy when not pushing on some job or other. This makes it difficult for me to take holidays and impossible to take to pleasure."

"I draw no conclusion whatever from these facts, and I advise you to be equally cautious. I gave up eating meat in 1880."

### Shaw Wants New Party.

Seeing that the independent labor party in parliament is doing some practical good, Shaw wants a new party of his own. He says:

"I now solemnly abandon the labor party after doing my share of the work of setting it on its feet—or rather knees—in parliament. I now want to get my own class, disinherited poor relations and younger sons, the progeny of plutocrats and aristocrats, into Parliament and political array. I want a party of Socialists who have had enough of being gentlemen."

"No common workman need apply; his dissatisfaction with genteel life cannot be sincere because he has never tried it. Poor people are always objectionable. No poor person shall be admitted to my new party unless he can prove that his poverty is his own fault and that his parents were respectable."

The children of atheists who never have been to church will be rigidly excluded, but those who have been taken to church regularly every Sunday by parents and broke loose later will be welcome.

"All members over 30 must be married or at least domesticated bachelors. Libertines invariably idealize matrimony and put forward impracticable plans of education. Drunkards, borrowers and amateur gamblers will be excluded, not from moral prejudice, but because they are nuisances and will find plenty of congenial company in other parties."

### Tests for Party Membership.

"But disinterestedly irregular and in-subordinate persons will be specially welcome, provided they are ladies and gentlemen. Various tests of gentility will be applied. The candidate will be asked whether it ever occurred to him to clean his own boots or to go to bed in his day shirt. An affirmative answer will be a decisive disqualification. The thing must be kept secret at all costs."

"Playwrights and pianists complicate life until nobody can live on less than several thousand a year or earn it without practically continued activity, abolishing all pleasure, holidays and other agents of exhaustion and tediousness. Incidentally criticizing the labor party on all possible occasions with studied arrogance and without the slightest regard for its feelings."

### How It May Work.

"If any man idly inquires how the labor party and the Socialist party can do these things without a majority, I reply that if thirty men in earnest can prevent any man in a public assembly, no matter how large his majority, from wanting to waste their time by simply crying 'agreed' or 'divided' until he sits down, so the labor party and the Socialist party, if the House of Commons persists in neglecting the business of the nation and plodding through its party game of croquet, can do a great deal to spoil the genteel amenity of that fashionable body. In short, I will not say that if the House will not do our business it should be prevented from doing anything else; because it would like nothing better; but it might be prevented from enjoying its inactivity. There is no reason why the House should be made a comfortable place for the old bucks of the party world or the golden youth of the plutocracy."

"I do not suggest anything ill-mannered, noisy or violent, except when a bore has to be suppressed or the time limit imposed on the front bench by the head of the speaker or chairman who considers that time was not made for the right honorables."

### G. W. ATTENBOROUGH ILL.

Montreal, Aug. 26.—G. W. Attenborough, representative of the Manchester Guardian, on the British journalist tour, is in the hospital here, and likely to be here for some time. On the way east the party dined at a Chinese restaurant at Saskatoon, and he has never felt well since. In Ottawa he was taken ill, and on arrival of the train here he was taken to the hospital.

### STRIKES PROSTRATE BUTTE

Montana City Practically Cut Off—Even Mail Service Is Crippled.

Butte, Mont., Aug. 26.—This city is tied up completely by labor strikes. For six weeks the city has been without a telephone service on account of a sympathy strike of operators and linemen for some striking linemen in Utah. The courts have sustained mandamus writs against the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone Company to compel it to operate its lines, but so far as Butte is concerned the company has made no effort to resume service.

The telegraphic strike almost completely isolated Butte from the outside world and the newspapers contain no information of anything going on outside of Montana except through clippings from other newspapers that are three days old.

The strike of the mail clerks several months ago has left the postoffice service in a frightfully crippled condition and mail delivery is almost as uncertain as the telegraph. Only occasionally is an attempt made to distribute second class mail matter and Postmaster Gillis is unable to handle the situation or promise any relief.

The strike of the machinists is gradually closing down the mines of Butte. The machinists went out about a month ago. The machinists are demanding a raise from \$4.50 to \$5 a day.

### A WINGHAM CASE.

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 26.—A judgment was given by the divisional court this morning in the action of Alexander Brown against A. Dulmage, both farmers and all who stand agreed to purchase a store from Dulmage, paying \$1,000 on account, but afterwards withdrew from the bargain and sued to recover \$1,000, but the action was dismissed. Today Brown's appeal also was dismissed.
