ONTARIO LIBERALS NAME COMMITTEE TO SELECT NEW LEADER

Choice Will Be Made Within Next Thirty Days — Must Be in Sympathy With Progressive Policies That Have Been Advocated by Hon. N. W. Rowell.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
 TORONTO, Oct. 18.—Ontario Liberals did not choose a successor to Hon. Newton W. Rowell as leader of the Opposition in the Legislature, at their meeting this afternoon, but they passed a resolution expressing their determination to continue the fight for the progressive policies advocated in recent years, and appointed a committee of seven to decide on the mode of procedure in connection with the appointment of a provincial leader and to formulate the program of business to be brought before the adjourned meeting to be held within the next thirty days.

The resolution with regard to the future policy of the party was an important one. It was moved by Dr. J. M. Rodgers (South Oxford), and seconded by John Greive (North Middlesex), and read as follows:

"That we, as Liberal members and candidates, assembled here today, desire to place on record our determination to maintain the same high standards which have been established by the Liberal party during recent years; and that, as heretofore, progressive policies shall be advocated, and we remain united in advocating the measures which are in the best interests of the masses of the people, and that a leader in sympathy with this position be selected and elected. Newton W. Rowell as the provincial leader of the Liberal party."

Will Choose Within Month.
 Chas. E. Bowman, chief of the Liberal whip in the Legislature, who was appointed to give a report of the meeting to the press, stated that another meeting will be held at the rooms of the

Reform Association, 36 Toronto street, Toronto, within the next thirty days, to decide on the mode of procedure in connection with the appointment of Mr. Rowell's successor.

A committee composed of Messrs. Bowman, William Frostfoot (Centre Huron), Zoticque Mearns (Sturgeon Falls), Harry Dewar, K. C. (South-west Toronto), J. C. Elliott (West Middlesex), R. L. Brackin (West Kent), and Dr. J. M. Rodgers (South Oxford), was appointed to formulate a program of the business which will be brought before the meeting.

How Will Choice Be Made?
 One matter that will have to be decided is who will vote on the question of the new leader. Some suggest that Liberal candidates in the last general election should have a voice in the selection of the new leader. Others would have a big provincial convention to decide who the new head of the party should be.

"We did not discuss names at all," was the reply of every member spoken to on the subject.

Practically every Liberal member of the Legislature and every candidate for the Legislature was present at the meeting, which was held in the rooms of the Reform Association.

Mr. Rowell was present for a short time and delivered a short address, giving his reasons for joining the new Union Government. His one desire, he said, was to see the Liberal party as the more vigorous prosecution of the war. Mr. Rowell's address was followed by short speeches from several of the members, who expressed their profound admiration for him, and their deep regret over his resignation as their leader.

RAILWAYMEN ON FIFTY LINES TO ASK INCREASES

Lines in Northeastern United States and Eastern Canada Are Affected.

OTTAWA, Oct. 18.—From thirty-five to fifty railroad systems in the northeastern part of the United States and in eastern Canada will be asked to increase the wages of trainmen, baggage-men, yardmen and conductors not less than 20 per cent, as the result of the deliberations of 104 chairmen of the trainmen and conductors' organizations on these lines, at the annual convention which concluded here this evening. The convention, which was held at the Hotel St. Charles, was the largest ever held in this city. The delegates, who were elected from the 104 organizations, will at once be communicated to the 200,000 or more workers affected, for their approval. The delegates are also to be notified. Conferences were held in Toronto between these two companies to fix the proportion of cost of marketing bacon in England, and to be absorbed by the war office buyers overseas. These admissions were made by J. T. Matthews, secretary-treasurer of the Matthews-Blackwell Company this afternoon at the resumed inquiry of the Government commission into profits of cold storage companies.

It was further admitted that the fixing of prices for hogs in Canada was contingent upon the other.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.—C. A. C. B. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, in the new Government at Ottawa. The retirement of Mr. Cahan does not leave the field to Hon. Mr. Ballantyne alone, as A. D. Weldon, also a Conservative, will remain as a man to whom monuments would be erected in the market place. Mr. Cahan said he believed Sir Robert Borden should have followed the Liberal leader into the cabinet at the beginning of the war, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier had called for a truce from political strife.

NEW PRESIDENT OF QUEEN'S.
 KINGSTON, Oct. 18.—At a meeting of Queen's University trustees the appointment of Dr. R. H. Taylor, Montreal, as principal, duties to commence on the 1st of December, was notified. Dr. F. L. Lammer, Harvard, was appointed professor of physics, and O. S. F. Smith, assistant professor of physics in Pennsylvania State College, was appointed lecturer in physics. Notice was received from the Ontario Department of Education that the agreement with regard to the faculty of education at Queen's was to be terminated in July, 1918.

LEE-COLLISON.
 FOREST, Oct. 18.—Miss Dorothy Collison, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Collison, Forest, was married in Toronto recently to George Harry Lee of Toronto, by Rev. Oswald Smith. Mr. and Mrs. Lee have arrived in Forest, and have taken up their residence here.

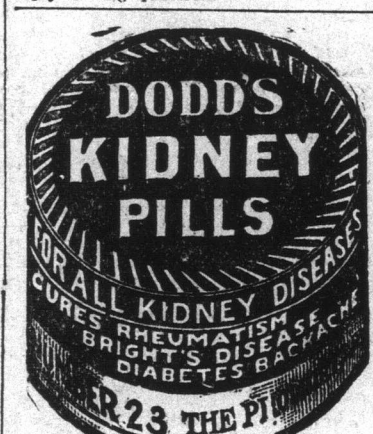
Britain Has Never Negotiated With Vatican For Peace

Lord Cecil Says Wilson's Note Was Not Inspired by Allies.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Replying to a question in the House of Commons today, Lord Robert Cecil, minister of blockade, denied that negotiations for terms of peace had taken place with the Vatican or any of its agents or with any other religious organization.

Just previous to this Lord Robert had been asked whether the British Government intended to send any reply to Pope Benedict's peace note. His response was a request that notice be given of the question. It had not been officially announced, he added, that Great Britain had adopted as its own reply the reply sent by the United States.

The clear and powerful reply of President Wilson, explained Lord Robert Cecil, "was not the result of any consultation of the Allies, and I do not propose to comment upon it in reply to the question."

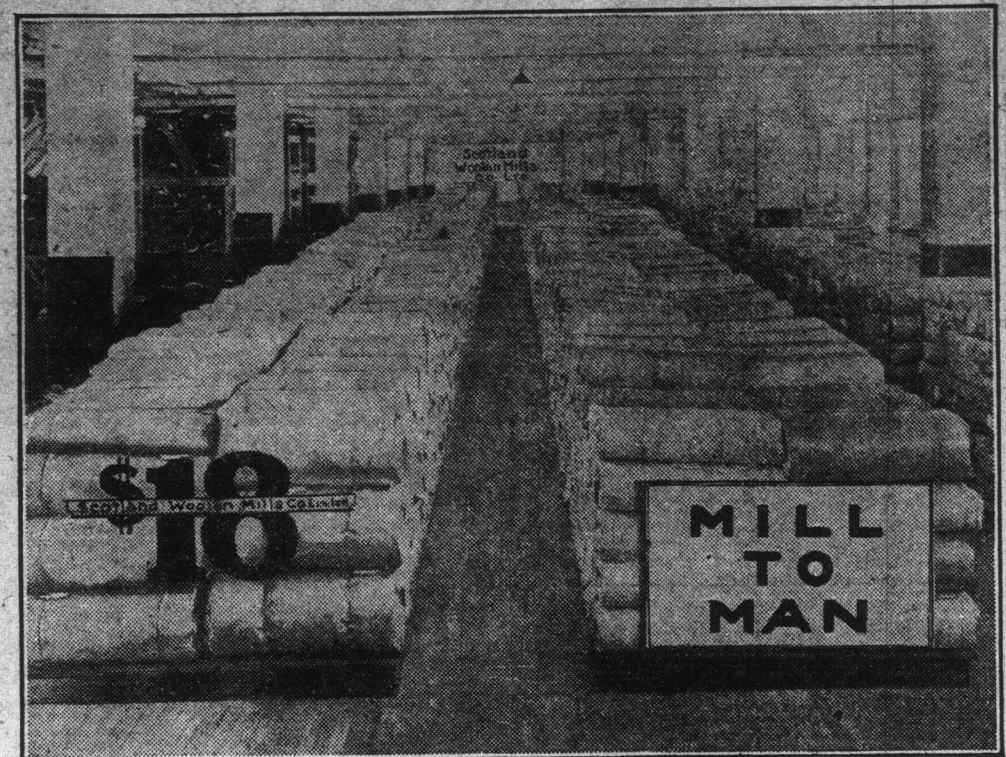
