And it is probably the worst handled railway in the world. All along the 3,500 miles of this double-track railway there are people constantly wrecking the trains and hindering supplies from going to Admiral Kolchak's white army, which is an army only in name. wonderful place to live. "On this trip we spent twelve days in covering 1,450 miles, which is an average of 121 miles every 24 hours. Isn't that awful? At the stations such horrible sights would greet us. Once we helted pert a Resign typhus train and




