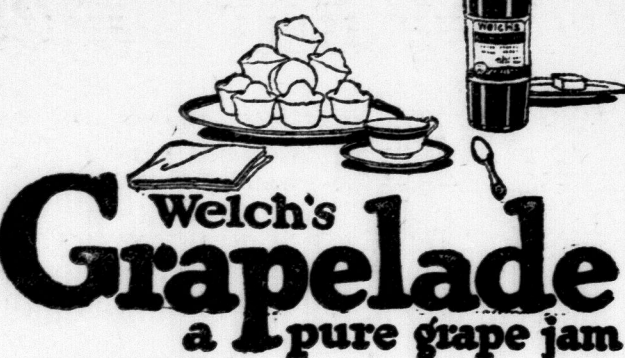
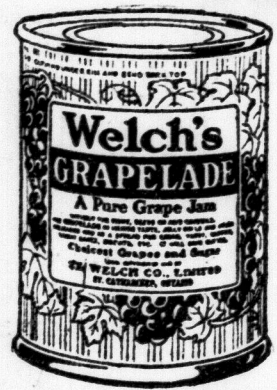


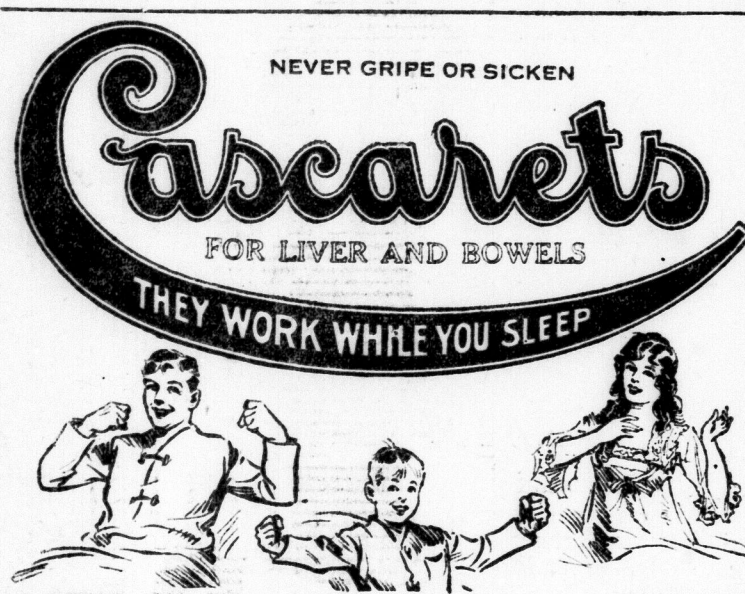

ALLOWED TO GO.—Charles Clinton,

driving from Toronto to Windsor in an
auto filled with bottles of liquor. This
liquor runner also was fined \$500.

OBJECT TO CEMETERY

AT CARROLL'S POINT

Toronto, March 23.—By Canadian
Press.—Opposition to the proposal of
the city of Hamilton to establish a
cemetery at Carroll's Point was taken
up by representatives of the township of
East Flamboro, before Dr. J. W. S.
McCullough, provincial officer of
health, at Queen's Park this morning.
Delegates from Hamilton city council
and cemeteries board were present,
and the pros and cons of the
matter were thoroughly discussed. The
provincial board of health will pro-
vide its decision in the matter
this afternoon. East Flamboro
people object because of the possible
danger to the district water supply.

CLAIMS ALIENATION OF WIFE'S AFFECTION

Returned Soldier Takes Trou-
bles To Court.

EXAMINED TODAY

Tells Tale To Mr. Justice
Latchford At Spring
Assizes.

Claiming that his wife's affections had
been alienated by Albert Lewis of this
city, Arthur E. Morley, a returned sol-
dier, residing at 481 Talbot street, is
suing him for damages. The case is
the first one to be brought up at the
spring assizes, which started yester-
day. It is being tried before Hon. Mr.
Justice Latchford.

The plaintiff was in the witness stand
all morning. Questioned by his coun-
sel, J. M. McEvoy, he told the story of
his troubles from the time the family
first met Lewis some months before
Morley went overseas in 1916. The de-
fendant, who became acquainted with
the family through coming to the
house to make collections of money,
was called before Morley after he
went away to the front and told him
in his actions that was blamewor-
thy.

When He Returned.

When he returned home his wife
was living with the six children at 49
Bruce street. As an invalid, his con-
dition he went to the Central Military
Hospital for treatment. While in
hospital he was visited by Lewis, who
was then living at 181 Bricestreet, a
house belonging to the defendant at 181
Bricestreet. Morley had no part in
the wife's dress and conduct while
he was in the hospital, and separation
allowance. Coming from the hospital,
he went to the defendant's house, Lewis
was a frequent visitor.

After he told him that Lewis
was coming to live with them,
and soon after Lewis sold his business
and moved into the house. Lewis
boarded with the family. The plain-
tiff thought that Lewis was too pre-
sumptuous in coming to live with
his wife concerning his actions.
She refused to see it in the same light.

He Stayed.

Lewis lived in the two rooms from
September to January. Morley claimed
that he refused to eat at the same table
with Lewis, but the defendant
stayed. Morley said that Lewis inter-
fered with his children and he object-
ed, but his wife sided in with Lewis.

As far as Morley knew his wife did
not go out with Lewis except when he
was with them, and he felt too
sick to go. He objected to the de-
fendant buying anything for his wife
and children and letting them out of
the house. He said that Lewis told
him his intentions were honorable,
Lewis was producing in a prudent
statement was made when it came.

Smash His Face.

The plaintiff said he felt sick
during the time that he was taking a
vocational training. On January 1 he
was ill, and said that Lewis told
him that he was going to take his
wife, and that he wanted the rooms
for himself. "I'll smash your dirty face
if you tell me to go to the hospital,"
he said.

Dr. Lewis Douglas attended Morley
but the plaintiff said that he had a
private interview with Lewis at the
time he was in the hospital. Dr. Douglas
told him that Lewis was a dangerous
man, and that he should be kept out
of the house. He said that Lewis told
him that he was going to take his
children from her, and Lewis went out
and called some policemen who refused to
interfere.

Magistrate Graydon invited Morley to
show him where he got the injury. He
said that Lewis told him that he was
going to take his wife, and that he
wanted the rooms for himself. He was

that he would take action against
Morley for drawing poison under false
pretences.

On January 8 when Morley returned
to his house he found all his belongings
lying outside the house in the snow.

The plaintiff was cross-examined by

G.W.V.A. CONVENTION MAY BE TRANSFERRED TO CANADA'S CAPITAL

Veterans Want Move Made So
All Could Appear Before
Parliament.

PRESIDENT IS ILL

Purney Prevented From Fur-
ther Participation in
Meeting.

Montreal, March 23.—By the Canadian
Press.—A report containing rules and
regulations to govern the order of busi-
ness and a time limit for speakers, was
the first matter taken up by the dele-
gates to the G. W. V. A. in annual
convention at the Windsor Hotel, when
they met this morning. After the
chaotic debate on a franchise resolution
appointed, a procedure committee was
appointed, and this morning it recom-
mended that speakers be allowed the
floor only once on each question, and
be permitted to speak for three min-
utes only. The committee also drew up
a schedule of matters to be discussed,
and the order in which they will be
taken up. It follows:

Pensions, re-establishment, land set-
tlement, association constitution, lib-
national resources, policy and fraternal
issue. The report was adopted.

The question was dealt with in a
long resolution which dealt with a var-
iety of suggestions for improving pen-
sioners' conditions, and which will be
taken up. It follows:

During the morning President Pur-
ney, debarr'd by illness from taking
any further active part in the conven-
tion's deliberations, delivered his val-
ue-dictory address.

At this juncture the session was ad-
journed, with the understanding that
the resolution and amendment should be
the first business of the afternoon.
