

Montreal, March 23 .- By the Canadia Press .- A report containing rules and regulations to govern the order of business and a time limit for speakers, was the first matter taken up by the delegates to the G. After the chaotic debate on a franchise resolution yesterday, a procedure committee was appointed, and this morning it recommended that speakers be allowed the floor only once on each question, and be permitted to speak for three minutes only. The committee also drew up a schedule of matters to be discussed, and the order in which they will be

taken up. It follows:
Pensions, re-establishment, land settlement, association constitution, habor, national resources, policy and fraternal idea. The report was adopted. The pensions question was dealt with in a long resolution which dealt with a variety of suggestions for improving pensioners' conditions.

During the morning President Pur-ney, debarred by illness from taking any further active part in the conven-tion's deliberations, delivered his vale-dictory address. A move to change the venue of the convention to Ottawa immediately was made this morning. A motion was made first of all asking that three dele.

gates from each provincial command be appointed to accompany the Do-minion executive to Ottawa to pre-sent before parliament the resolutions to be passed by the convention. To this motion an amendment was offered and seconded providing for the adjournment of the convention to Ottawa, there to conclude its business, the entire body to present itself before the government. This amendment had enough supporters to justify the asking of a voll call yets after a show of call vote, after a show of hands had failed to definitely establish

At this juncture the session was ad-journed, with the understanding that the resolution and amendment should be the first business of the afternoon.




