Declared Hon. Peter Smith A Belmont Milk Producers' Picnic—Warns Farmers To Keep Line Fences Up—Keep Prepared.

BELMONT, July 7.—Hon. Peter Smith, M.L.A., provincial treasurer, who was the principal speaker at the big picnic on the fair grounds here today under the joint auspices of the Belmont Milk Producers' Association and the Ontario Agricultural Society, said with spirit to the critics of the Ontario Government by the Toronto Globe and other papers, because of the government's slow and steady policy in regard to hydro radial development.
