Belongs to the Children, Says Dean of Western Medical School.

Dr. McCallum said that in no other city on this continent was there a children's hospital being erected as a war memorial. There had been no attempt to keep pace with the changing years. Elsewhere someone had said: "The 17th century was Versailles—its pomp and imperialism; the 18th was for man, the 19th was for humanity"; but, said the doctor, "the 20th is the century of the child and child life." The Daughters of the Empire had caught an inspiration to blend the ancient and the modern. The age-long cenotaph of the pagans was chang from an empty tomb to a structure containing living childhood.

The speaker pointed out that one of the foremost children's hospitals of the continent is situated at Toronto.
