APRIL FOOL PRANK.

Leads to Sad Tragedy at Asheville, North Carolina.

ASHEVILLE, N. C., April 16.—Enraged at his 15-year-old daughter Nellie, because of a harmless schoolgirl prank, Dr. C. O. Swinney, who recently came here from New York, to-day shot and fatally wounded her, and then killed himself.

The tragedy occurred in the reception room of the normal and collegiate institute, a girl's boarding school, where Miss Swinney was a pupil. Recently Swinney's daughter was one of a number of the school girls, who, as an April fool joke, absented themselves from school and the father brooded over the little escapade until it assumed to him the proportions of an actual wrong-doing. Dr. Swinney called on his daughter at the school this afternoon, and the tragedy followed.

BLAME THE PREACHER.

Scenes in Brantford Trade and Labor Council.

BRANTFORD, April 16.—There were some lively times at Trades and Labor Council when the strike of the moulders at Buck's Stone Works in this city was considered. Deputation of members was present and alleged that Rev. Mr. Protich, a foreign missionary, who is working among the foreign element in this city, and Chief Squire of the local police, were making every effort to secure strike-breakers to take the place of the moulders at the Buck's works. They asserted that in one instance the two had gone to a foreigner, who was out of work, and told him if he did not go to work at Buck's, he would be arrested for vagrancy. A committee was appointed to investigate the charge.




