There seems to be no doubt that in emotional roles Miss Marion Terry is among the greatest living actresses.

A cast of surpassing excellence will aid in fittingly presenting this remarkable play. Miss Ida Conquest is well-known to theatregoers here as an actress of sterling ability and great personal charm. The three leading male parts will be played by men who are at the head of their profession: Vincent Serrano, Eben Plympton and John Glendinning.

"FIFTY MILES FROM BOSTON."

George M. Cohan's highly entertaining musical play, which has scored a big success in New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, and in fact all of the large cities of America, is announced for production at the Grand Opera House next week for the first time in this city. Mr. Cohan has written innumerable plays that have met with much favor from the theatregoing public of America, but in none of them has he scored more decisively than in "Fifty Miles From Boston," the scenes of which are laid in the Village of Brookfield, Mass., and the characters deal with types taken from that locality where Mr. Cohan spent a part of his boyhood days.
