

TORONTO'S CREDIT HIGH ASSERTS MAYOR OLIVER

His Worship Says Haste May Save
City \$15,000 in Flotation
of Bonds

NEW YORK, May 21.—Mayor Oliver, who arrived this morning on the Mauretania from London, Eng., stated that he and the city treasurer had arranged for the flotation of \$250,000 bonds of the City of Toronto at 102-1/2, thereby confirming the Associated Press despatch of several days ago.

The idea in having the mayor return to New York while City Treasurer Coady remains in London is to save express and insurance by consigning the bonds to London as unfinished stock, as they do not become valuable until completed by the signature of Mr. Coady. The mayor hopes that the bonds can be marketed before the duties imposed by the new British budget come into force, as he estimates that the city would have to pay \$15,000 more for the flotation under the new regulations.

Mayor Oliver says the credit of Toronto stands higher than any other city in Canada. The bankers' first offer for the bonds was 98, which they afterwards increased to 100, but the mayor intimated that the city would not accept any terms which would not be less than par. The city will realize exactly 100 on the sales, as 2 per cent. goes for brokers' commissions and 1-1/2 per cent. to the government for stamp duty.

The mayor arranged with Lloyd's to secure two loans at six months each—one of \$60,000 at 2-1/4 per cent. and another for the same amount at 2-1/8 per cent. He says these loans can be used on various big works at the start, thereby avoiding the necessity for floating other bond loans as early as would otherwise be the case.

The bonds floated are all for 40-year terms. They include \$150,000 for the filtration plant; \$44,000 for the new bridge; \$41,000 for hospital; \$27,000 for public schools; \$20,000 for high schools; \$20,000 for parks and playgrounds; and \$10,000 for hospital grant.

Acting City Treasurer Patterson received a wire from the mayor yesterday that he will be back in Toronto next Wednesday.

AUTO DRIVER LIABLE

One-Legged Tailor Given Judgment in
Suit Against Wm. Knapp

In the non-jury session Judge McMahon yesterday found William H. Knapp liable for injuries caused Albert Russell, aged 19, a one-legged tailor.

In December last, Russell, while riding a bicycle, was run down by Knapp, who was driving an automobile. A bystander, J. Dillon, testified that Russell was traveling at the rate of about 6 miles an hour on George-street near Queen-street when he was overtaken by the auto, which was moving 20 miles an hour.

Dr. St. Charles said the injuries to Russell's nervous system were such that he might not recover for several years.

Russell is suing to recover \$5000. The amount of damages was not announced.

CONNIE SUES FOR PEACE

Calls on Sir James and Says There'll
Be No Trouble

James Connie, M.P., visited the parliament buildings yesterday morning with the olive branch displayed. He first saw Hon. P. Cochrane, minister of lands, forests and mines, and at noon saw Sir James Whitney for a few minutes.

Senator Mr. Connie said he did not anticipate any friction with the government over the Ontario and Michigan Power Bill. They only wanted a federal charter to deal with United States government awards as they were dealing with an international stream.
