The paving of Dundas-street east of Keele-street is decidedly drawing to a close. Contractor Dill stated to-day that the entire distance from Keele-st. to Humberside-avenue, with all tracks in position, would be completed in three days. The replacing of the switch at Humberside caused consider-

able trouble, as the intersections could not be made to meet properly, but to-day the work was finished satisfac-torily and the tracks are in position. There only remains now overhead wires, as the tracks are not in the same position in the stree they were before being torn up. the street as will then remain for Manager Fleming to run the cars to Keele-st. again, but the town officials are doubtful what his response will be.
