After Rough Journey in Early Stages—Grumpy Won Second Feature.



JOE BLAIR CREATES NEW WORLD'S RECORD

Three and One-Half Furlongs in Thirty-Nine Flat Saturday at Juarez.

JUAREZ, Mex., Feb. 5.—Phil Musgrave's Joe Blair created a new world's record for three and a half furlongs when he easily won the special race at Juarez today in 39 flat. The former record was held by James Butler's Supremacy, carrying 115 pounds, who stepped the distance in 39 1-5.

The performance of Joe Blair today stamps him as a speedy horse, but capable only of carrying his speed a short distance. The pace in the race was terrific right from the start. The fractions were 11 2-5, 22 1-5, 33 4-5, 38. It was due chiefly to Loftus that he attained victory, tho at the end he had a comfortable lead over his opponent.



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FAST TROTTERS IN AUSTRALIA

Andrew Robertson, the prominent horse-breeder of Melbourne, issues a warning to American owners of trotters and pacers who might figure they could clean up over in Australia, because mile races are won in 2:20 or worse. There are many trotters capable of going in two minutes and ten seconds over there.


The explanation is that the standing starts hold forth in the antipodes, and it easily makes a difference of ten seconds to get off winging. Then, too, the races are handicap affairs at various distances, such as nine furlongs and the like. American horses have not been trained to the system, and they are at a disadvantage to compete with the Australian trotters and pacers.

In this country a horse is schooled to start from a turn and score up to the starter for a word. The fields are not sent off until a horse is in the stride and going at a pretty fair speed. We have classes for horses that is, when a trotter or pacer wins a race in 2:10 or a fraction he has to go in the 2:11 classification the following year.

It is all changed in Australia, and the system works fine, according to the promoters of the country. The horses are handicapped. The sulky star with the fastest record is put back at the limit mark of say 35 yards in back of the wire. The other starters are ranged along up to the fortunate ones that start at the wire. The field is placed on the marks, and from a standing start the word is given to go.

The Australian horses are schooled to jump right into a trot or pace, as their gait might be. It usually takes the American horse some time to get going. Naturally time is lost before a horse reaches his top speed, and that makes the difference in the time.
