ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ATTENDING PHYSICIAN TO THE PROTESTANT HOUSE OF INDUSTRY AND REFUGE FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st MARCH, 1870.

To the Board of Management, Protestant House of Industry and Refuge:

Gentlemen,—It is extremely satisfactory to be able to report to you that the reputation for salubrity of the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge still continues to be maintained. No serious disease or contagious affection of any kind has appeared in the Institution during the past year. Several inmates who were taken sick, have, as usual, been sent to the Montreal General Hospital. A considerable number of convalescents from the same Hospital have been received into the Institution and kept until their health was quite restored: in this way, I think, much good has been done. Only one death has occurred in the House during the past year, but I have included in the following list all those who have been inmates for a length of time but who died elsewhere—all are male adults:—
