## CANADIANS WIN FROM BRITAINS

Canadian Artillerymen Prove Too Much for Visitors from the Old Country.

Petawawa, Ont., July 30.—The Canadian composite teams won the Londonderry challenge cup and the Prince of Wales cup today. The score was: British, 549.06 in field and 507 in heavy; Canadians, 524.06 in field and 508 in heavy. The Canadian heavy team fired eleven effective shots out of sixteen to the British three. The results were announced at the C. A. A. dinner to the British team tonight.

The competition between the British and Canadian composite teams for the Londonderry and Prince of Wales cups was finished today.

In the field competition yesterday the British had a clear advantage, the Canadians having one gun out of action in the indirect series. Today, using the big 47 guns, Canada reversed the situation. The Canadians were sharper in gun discipline, did better drill and found ranges better.

In the direct series Capt. Ewing of Montreal, was battery commander of the Canadian team and Lt. McGowan, of St. John, sectional commander. In the indirect, Major Heigh was battery commander and Capt. McKinnon, of Charlottetown (P. E. I.), sectional.

## JAPAN AND COREA

New Convention Gives Japan Complete Domination Over Korea.

TOKIO, July 29.—The new convention between Japan and Korea has been signed at Seoul. In general effect it renders the whole government and administration of Korea subject to the Japanese resident-general, to whom it gives a voice even in the appointment of foreigners. The convention was strongly opposed by the Korean court.

It is stated that the article provides: First, that the Korean administration shall seek guidance from the Japanese resident-general.

Second, that all laws and ordinances of the Korean government shall require the approval of the resident-general.

Third, that the appointment of all high and responsible Korean officials shall require the approval of the resident-general before they can become effective.

Fourth, that only persons recommended by the resident-general shall be eligible for office in the Korean government.

Fifth, that there shall be a distinct line of demarcation between administrative and judicial affairs.

Sixth, that foreigners shall be employed only with the consent of the resident-general.

Seventh, that the clause of the convention of August, 1904, shall be annulled. This clause provided for the employment of a financial adviser to the Korean government.

The removal of the former emperor to Tokyo was not included in the Japanese demands.

The sympathy and approval of foreign powers in the new regime are assured.

Anticipating further disturbances in Korea, troops from the Kooka division were dispatched to that country today. A second Japanese naval squadron has already reached Chemulpo.

Marquis Ito is said to have assumed a strong attitude and to be threatening withdrawal of the residence-general in case of further opposition to the carrying out of Japan's plans.

OSTRICH FARMING IN SOUTH AFRICA

Nineteen permits to capture ostriches for domestication and farming purposes were issued during the year. These permitted the capture of 943 ostriches.

"Ostrich farming," says the report, "is becoming quite an industry in the Enkeldoort district, and I have recently been approached for government aid in providing farmers with fencing wire, and a proposition is being laid with the administration with a view to this."—Rhodesia Herald.
