Petrograd, Oct. 8—There is renewed military activity on the northern end of the Russian front, from Dvinsk to Novo Grodek. The heaviest fighting is in the neighborhood of Dvinsk, to the south of which the Germans have had some success. On the whole, however, the Russians have been able to withstand their assaults. assaults.

The Germans have succeeded in crossing the Viliya, north of Smorgon, enabling them to co-ordinate their forces north and south of this point.

Berlin, via London, Oct. 8—The Teutonic invasion of Serbia is proceeding favorably, progress in the crossing of the Drina, Save and Danube by the German and Austrian armies under Field Marshal Von Mackensen being reported by German army headquarters.

The Most of the Best PROFESSOR PRINCE IN THE CITY TODAY

Has Been at Final Meeting of Fisheries Advisory Board-An Important Fishery Matter

Professor E. E. Prince of the Dominion Fisheries Commission arrived in the city today on his way to Ottawa after attending a meeting of the fisheries advisory board, Atlantic division, in Charlottetown. The commission was appointed for a term of three years and as this time is about completed the meeting was the final one of the commission as at present constituted. Under the circumstances no new business was taken up, and the board limited itself to clearing up various matters connected with the protection of the fisheries and the fishermen which have been under consideration. There has been no intimation from Ottawa regarding the future of the board or off the work.

J. J. Cowie of the department of marine and fisheries, who has been holding meetings throughout St. John this week, conferring with the fishermen regarding the regulation which allows seining for sardine herring in this county while prohibiting it in Charlotte, was in the city today. He will report to Ottawa on the result of his inquiry.

Mr. Cowie is interested also in the encouragement of the herring curing business which the department is looking into at present. Owing to the war the Scottish and Norwegian herring fisheries are practically out of business and this affords a good opportunity to the Canadian fisherinen to take advantage of a market whih is crying for this produt. The herring imported from Europe are declared of a better grade than most of the product of our coast, partly because the Canadian fisheries are mostly coastal instead of deep-sea and also because of the wide difference in methods of curing and packing.


