PROFESSOR PRINCE IN THE CITY TODAY

Has Been at Final Meeting of Fisheries Advisory Board—An Important Fishery Matter

Professor E. E. Prince of the Dominion Fisheries Commission arrived in the city today on his way to Ottawa after attending a meeting of the fisheries advisory board, Atlantic division, in Charlottetown. The commission was appointed for a term of three years and as this time is about completed the meeting of the board is the last. Professor Prince is a member of the commission and is at present constituted. Under the circumstances no new business was taken up, and the board limited its work to clearing up various matters connected with the protection of the fisheries and the fisheries which have been under consideration. There has been no intimation from Ottawa regarding the future of the board or of the work.

J. J. Cowie of the department of marine and fisheries, who has been holding meetings throughout St. John this week, conferring with the fishermen regarding the regulation which allows sealing for sardine herring in this county while prohibiting it in Charlottetown, in the city today. He will report to Ottawa on the result of his inquiry.

Mr. Cowie is interested also in the encouragement of the herring curing business which the department is looking in to at present. Owing to the war the Scottish and Norwegian herring fisheries are practically out of business and this affords a good opportunity to the Canadian fishermen to take advantage of the market which is crying for this product. The herring imported from Europe is declared of a better grade than most of the product of our coast, partly because the Canadian fisheries are mostly coastal instead of deep-sea and also because of the wide difference in methods of curing and packing.

The big market in Chicago, New York and other large cities is due chiefly to the demands of the foreign born population who are accustomed to eat the Scotch herring as they come from the barrel to take which, it is said, the Canadian cured herring is superior. It is declared that if the methods of the Canadian Atlantic coast can be improved a rich harvest await the fishermen and dealers in this new market.

shrapnel and machine gun fire of the enemy, during the battle at Suva Bay, on August 24th.

Lieutenant Allee is a medical graduate of Dalhousie University, 1911 class, and is twenty-four years old. After graduating he went to Joggins Mines and later to Antigonish, remaining at each place for a short period. In January, 1914, he went to England for further study.

At the first of the present year he offered his services to the British government and was accepted, being attached to the 1st Royal Munster Fusiliers as a lieutenant in the medical corps. He sailed for the Daranelles on the steamer Cyclops the vessel which was beached in the straits so as to afford a landing for the allied troops. He has been in action ever since.

In Pay Office. With the rank of Staff Sergeant Major Harold Hatheway, son of Fred W. Hatheway of Fredericton, is now engaged at the pay office of the Canadian Headquarters in London, and will remain in England until the close of the war. He suffered severely from shock in a narrow escape which he had soon after the arrival of his unit on the firing line in Flanders and was invalided to England.

Lieut. McKen Hurst. Lieut. H. E. McKen, of the Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery, Halifax, received a bad fall while at work at this week at the Sandwich Battery on Oct. 5. He struck the concrete base, inflicting a very severe wound. He is a U. N. B. graduate.
