LONDON, Oct. 21-To the great satisfaction of Welsh ruby football en-thusiasts, the touring native Maori side from New Zealand, which opened its campaign in England with a spectacular victory against Somersetshire County, Saturday, 21 points to 8, has expressed perfect willingness, after all, to play under the Welsh rules and Welsh referees, thereby putting an end to what threatened to be a seri-

ous controversy in Wales to check un-fair play by the halfbacks and wing forwards.

The sides visiting the principality now finds themselves subject to re-strictions unknown elsewhere and it was widely advertised that the Maoris were not disposed to handicap them-selves this way. 
