#### RING.

Both teams have a number of consistent and hard hitters, and both can boast of strong defensive players. It is difficult to make a comparison of the individual players, as they have been up against different pitching.

For Championships.

Will Affiliate With A. A. U. of C.  
At a meeting of St. George's A. C. held last evening it was decided to affiliate with the M. P. branch of the Amateur Athletic Association of Canada and to send a delegation to the annual convention of the union to be held in August, October 14. It was also decided to be represented in the Wellington Bowling League. #### Y. M. C. A. ANNUAL FALL BANQUET

At the Y. M. C. A. annual fall banquet last night, L. A. Buckley, of Halifax, addressed the meeting on "The Place of the Y. M. C. A. in the Community." A member of each department gave a talk on the activities of the various classes. Jarvis Wilson represented the boys' department; Romild Shaw, the young men; Roy Willett, the seniors, and R. S. Stephenson, the business men. S. B. Fisher outlined a membership campaign. One hundred old members are out to get 100 new members.

The Y. M. C. A. annual fall opening banquet was held in their building last evening when about 100 of the business men and seniors were served by the Ladies' Auxiliary. The president, R. T. Barbour, was in the chair. The evening's programme began at 8:30 o'clock with supper. Rev. J. A. McKean asking the blessing. Then followed a ten-minute sing-song led by W. Bowie in which all joined. The president, in his opening address, welcomed both the old and new members. R. T. Hayes, M. P. P., presented the prizes won by the various Y. M. C. A. teams during the season. The winners basketball team, city and New Brunswick champions, large silver cup, which will be competed for this year by the city League teams; the Y. M. C. ### IMPROVEMENTS TO HOSPITAL PASSED

Plans for the extension of the epidemic hospital to provide accommodation for the nurses and for sixteen cases of measles at an additional expenditure of \$10,000, above the previous grant for the epidemic extension, were approved at the meeting of the board of commissioners of the general public hospital yesterday. This plan has been approved by the mayor of the city and warden of the county, who have undertaken to support a petition to the municipal council for the grant of the extra amount. Alterations to the present hospital and the former nurses' home, to give accommodation to 48 more patients, and an enlarged out-patient department also were approved. The interiors, the help, and part of the laboratory equipment are now housed in the former nurses' home and the space left in the hospital is being used for patients. Much business was transacted at the meeting and matters not dealt with were left for a special meeting to be called shortly. The financial statement showed receipts as follows: X Ray, \$171; seamen, \$201; paid patients, \$2,498.15; city chamberlain, \$10,187.06; total \$12,959.04. Expenses were \$9,508.65. The overdraft was \$19,854.28.

Dr. Roberts explained a scheme to clear out the present hospital basement, to bury the piping and heating beneath the ground, and replace the brick supports with steel stanchions at a cost of \$2,500. In the empty space, 24 feet by 80 feet, he proposed to provide accommodation for the out-patient department, for X-ray department, for clinic and for the admission of ambulance and general patients. The heating of the remodelled basement and of the flats above, together with the cost of emptying the basement, would cost about \$4,000. In the present out-patient department, accommodation would be provided for twenty-four more patients in addition to the eight private and eleven semi-private provided for by the nurses' home alteration.

The superintendent reported 169 patients admitted, sixteen died and 118 remained. There were fifty-nine operations in the operating rooms and fifty in out-patient department. Hon. Dr. Roberts, for the committee considering alterations to the epidemic hospital and enlargement of the out-patient department, reported that the plan to build a separate epidemic nurses' home was not approved and the erection of a new epidemic was considered an impossibility from a financial standpoint. The mayor and warden of the county had approved a proposition to extend the present epidemic to the north and east and would support a grant of \$10,000 by the Municipal Council for this purpose. Mr. Brodie submitted plans for proposed alterations.

The superintendent of nurses reported eight graduate nurses, sixty-one student nurses in the school, three on leave, three on vacation, four in Montreal, two in isolation and eight on night duty. Drs. Kelly, Allingham and McDonald were appointed as a committee on the appointment of a radiograph to consult with the commissioners. The dietician's report contained statistical statements with total expenses, \$8,089.26 for the food supplies for the month.

It was made known that the appropriation was being exceeded, but the hospital population has increased since the appropriation was made.

Fatality in Sydney.

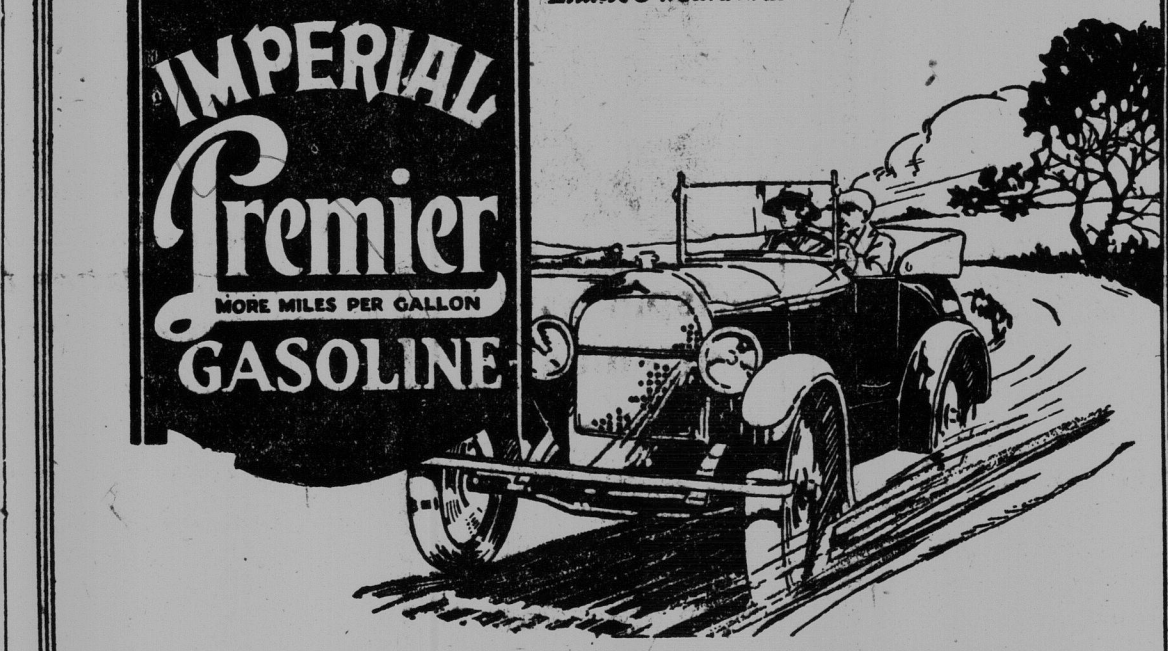

### DISCUSS HYDRO ELECTRIC MATTER

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trade was held last evening in the board rooms with W. F. Burditt in the chair. The chairman introduced the question of hydro-electric power. He said that the questions were: How was it to be rendered available for the citizens? What would be the cost and how was it to be distributed? C. O. Foss, member of and engineer to the N. B. Electric Power commission, was the first speaker. He said that he felt sure that they would be able to deliver power early in 1922; if not at the end of 1921, at least by the end of January. The act required that the commission offer the power to the municipality. The offer had been made last winter, but no answer as yet had been received. The mayor had told him that the city probably would follow the example of Halifax, which had finally decided to take over the power. If the city did not take the power, he said, the commission would have to sell it to any one that wanted it. The commission had made no estimate of the cost of the general distribution of power over the city. No rate had been fixed in the offer to the city. The chairman of the commission was now in Ontario studying the rates there, and the speaker was going to Montreal to discuss rates with officials of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company and the Southern Canada Power Company. He said that it was the intention to handle the power here at about the same rates as in Quebec and Ontario. In reply to a question, Mr. Foss would not give his views as a private citizen as to what the city should do in the matter. He said that the cost would be from .01 cent to .01-1-4 cents delivered at the border of the city, if all the power were taken. He explained how the rates were fixed in Ontario, the general basis being \$12 per horse power connected motor load, plus a meter rate. J. Fraser Gregory thought that an initial charge of \$12 was a heavy tax. L. W. Simms said that the citizens' money was in the project. The idea was to furnish cheap power to foster present industries and attract new ones. The price of power must be very low or there would be no inducement to change. The mayor said that the commission had not yet given any guarantee what power it would deliver nor what it would cost. He said that if the government was prepared to guarantee so much power at a fixed price the power company should buy its power from the city at practically no cost. W. F. Hatheway said that the government should make a written offer to the city at a definite price, guaranteeing a certain amount and giving a certain time for the city to decline or accept. He drew attention to the desirability of the city having control. The mayor asked that a committee from the board be appointed to meet with the council the next time that the power question was discussed. A motion also was passed approving the proposed by-law in regard to the mayor having control of parades.

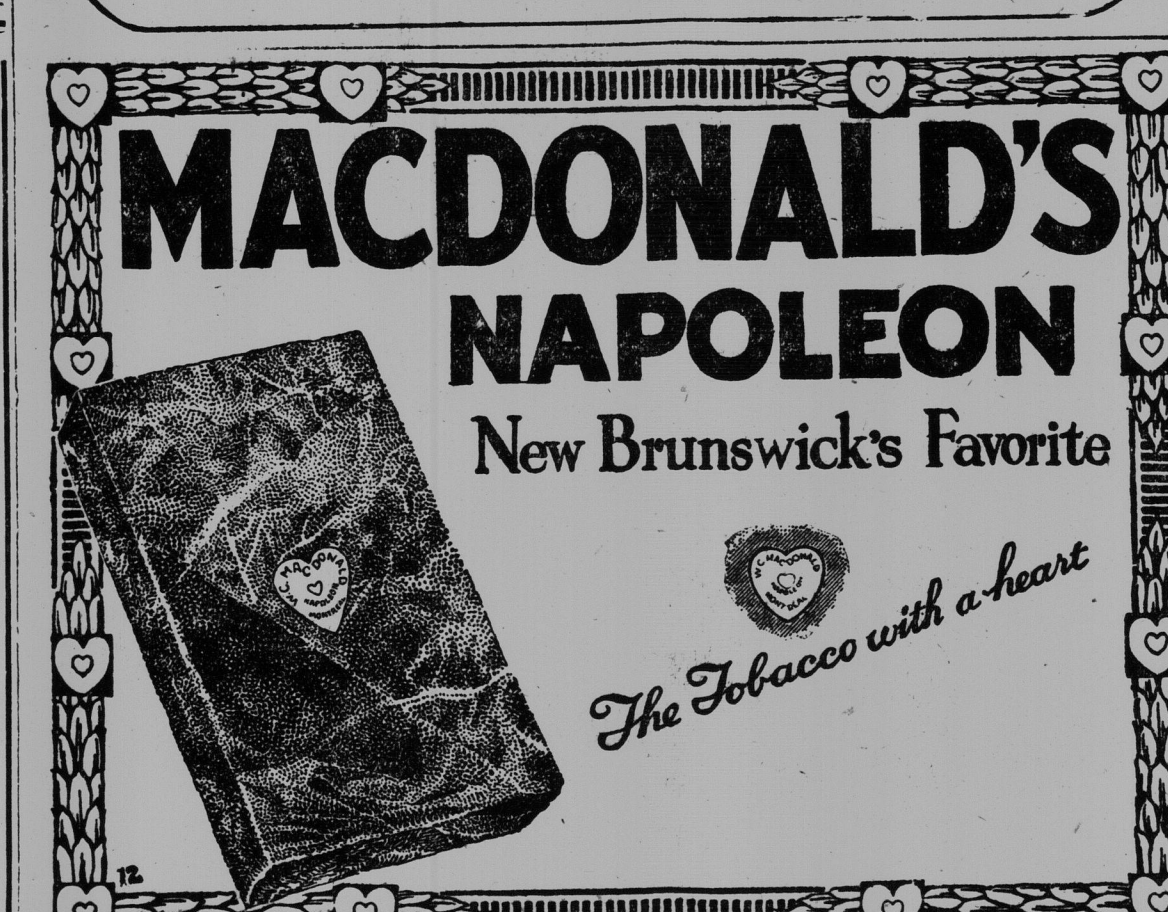
