

## SPORT NEWS OF A DAY, HOME AND ABROAD

### BASEBALL

**Under New Government.**  
New York, Dec. 12.—Baseball leaders today were enthusiastic over an agreement reached here yesterday by representatives of the major and minor leagues, changing the constitution of baseball. The proposals agreed upon at a meeting marked by harmony must be accepted by plenary sessions of the leagues involved before they become the law governing the sport. The belief prevailed generally that ratification was merely a matter of form.

The National League probably will act upon the agreement at its annual meeting here tomorrow. The American league will pass judgment in Chicago on Friday. The National Association of Minor Leagues will hold a special meeting in Chicago on January 10 to take action.

The draft question is the only important clause upon which there is not unanimous opinion. The smaller organizations may settle this as they wish at their Chicago session.

**Cobb as Manager.**  
New Orleans, Dec. 12.—Ty Cobb is going to manage the 1921 Detroit Tigers. The contract which will give Ty complete authority over the players now under reserve and those to be purchased may be signed in New Orleans.

Frank J. Navin, president of the Tigers, may come here for a final conference with the Georgian, or meet him at his August, Ga., home on or before December 15.

Cobb, now on a duck shooting trip with Rick Woodward, owner of the Birmingham Club, and a party of wealthy sportsmen, practically admitted the management of the club had been forced upon him before departing for the mouth of the Mississippi River.

To intimate friends in New Orleans Cobb said he preferred to continue a private life in the ranks, but Frank J. Navin declined to accept his stand, and insists Ty assume the burden of rebuilding the club. Cobb, according to several of his New Orleans friends, will sign a three-year contract. The salary he is to receive no doubt will be in the neighborhood of \$80,000 per season. As a private Ty's annual pay from Detroit has been mentioned as ranging from \$15,000 to \$25,000.

In addition to drawing the largest salary Detroit has ever paid a manager, Cobb will be retained for 1921 service and those to be traded, sold or shipped to the minors.

Cleveland, Dec. 12.—The annual meeting of the National Baseball Federation will be held here on January 15. Election of officers and plans for the coming season will be made at the meeting.

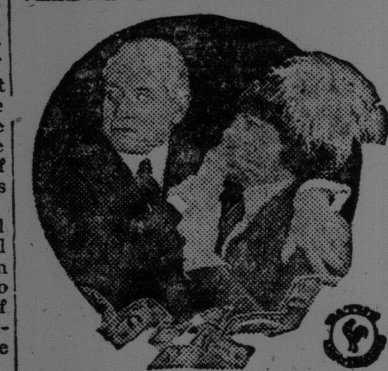

**Two Big Bouts.**  
New York, Dec. 12.—Two world's championship matches—wrestling and boxing—were on the card for New York sport enthusiasts on consecutive nights this week.

Tonight Joe Stecher, of Dodge, Neb., will defend his heavyweight catch-as-catch-can title against Ed "Strangler" Lewis of San Jose, Cal., and tomorrow night Jack Dempsey, champion heavyweight boxer, will face Bill Brennan, of Chicago, in a fifteen-round match at Madison Square Garden. The fighters virtually completed their training today.

Stecher has one victory to his credit over Lewis, won after three hours of strenuous struggle by the leady body "scissors" hold. Bothner, former light-weight champion wrestler, will be referee.

### GOLF

**Made It In One.**

Pinehurst, Dec. 12.—It has fallen to the lot of an English woman, now on a short visit to this country, to achieve the first hole ever made in one at Pinehurst by a woman player. Mrs. Frederick P. S. Harris of London and the Stannore Country Club, playing a four ball match this afternoon, stepped into her appointed niche in the hall of fame at the end of her drive for the eleventh hole.

The hole is a relatively short one—the distance is only 168 yards—but Mrs. Harris had to play in the face of a gale, and the ball carried to about twenty yards short of the green in a direct line with the flag, and finally rolled into the cup.

A search of golf statistics available at the Pinehurst Country Club not only shows that no other hole in one has been made here by a woman player, but also fails to reveal any record of a similar feminine achievement by any other course in the United States.

Mrs. Harris and her daughter, Mrs. Alan Scott Balfour who was a member of today's foursome, are well known in golfing and political circles in England.
