

GERMANS SEEK FINANCIAL AID IN UNITED STATES

Negotiations Are Opened With
New York Banks for Establish-
ment of Credits

New York, July 17.—Officials of the Deutsche Bank of Berlin have started negotiations with New York banks for establishment of credits for the benefit of German interests here. It is understood that the Deutsche Bank officials are not acting for themselves alone, but are the spokesmen for the German government and the proposed German banking "kartel," which it has been suggested be formed by the seven big private German banks and the Reichsbank to re-finance Germany.

The proposal of the German banks is that bank credits, either in the form of acceptance or otherwise, be opened here. Such a credit would be guaranteed jointly by the German government and the banking kartel. Nothing has been said definitely about the size of the credit desired, but bankers have been given to understand that the amount is considerable, with \$30,000,000 to \$50,000,000 for a beginning.

RECENT DEATHS

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 16.—Augustine Colin MacDonald, lieutenant-governor of Prince Edward Island, died this afternoon after an illness of several months. He was eighty-nine years old.

D. C. Eason, aged sixty-two, and a native of Derby, New Brunswick, died at the Royal Columbian Hospital, New Westminster, on Monday. He was engaged in logging for thirty years. He leaves a widow and four sons, N. F., who is a resident of Vancouver Island.

At Long Point, Kings county, on July 14, David M. McAlary passed away at his home after an illness of two months. Besides his wife he leaves two children, one brother and four sisters, including Mrs. John Barbary, Jr., of this city.

John T. McBean died suddenly in Victoria Hospital, Fredericton, yesterday afternoon at the age of fifty-nine years. Besides his wife he leaves one brother.

AN OTTAWA VIEW OF SIR DOUGLAS HAZEN

"No Accounting For Tastes" is
Comment on His Alleged Will-
ingness to Re-enter Political Ar-
ena

Ottawa, July 17.—If the report that
Hon. J. D. Hazen is considering a return
to Ottawa proves true, it is not believed
here in government circles that he will
belong to the reconstructed cabinet
which Premier Borden is now working
on. He has been during his manhood
years active in politics in one way or
another, and reports are that it is diffi-
cult for him to settle down comfortably
to unexciting though highly respect-
able work of a Chief Justice of the Su-
preme Court of New Brunswick. It is
known that he has indicated that, like
Job's war horse, sniffing the fray from
afar is too much for him.

There is no accounting for tastes.
Where many men would use politics as a
jumping board to reach even a less ex-
alted position available for him, it
may be that he thinks there will be a
place for him as minister of public works
if Hon. Frank Carroll resigns but others
have the same idea for themselves. In
any case, cabinet reconstruction still de-
lays until the man from St. John, N. B.,
"fighting Frank," announces whether he
will stay or go.

There is also the possibility that Hon.
A. R. Maclean will retire from the gov-
ernment. He certainly will if he is not
minister of trade and commerce in the
reconstruction cabinet. He has been
for some time thinking of retiring in or-
der to engage in the practice of law in
Montreal, but he enjoys his work in the
trade and commerce department, and
will stay if kept there.

It is practically certain that the re-
construction of the cabinet will not be
on the fifty-fifty basis, half Liberals and
half Conservatives. Suitable men would
be obtained with regard to other condi-
tions, but it is certain that Conservative
representatives in the cabinet would be
strongest.

CHAPERONE, NOT MAN MANAGER FOR WOMEN SWIMMERS DEMANDED

New York, July 17.—After a protracted
meeting at the offices of the Amateur
Athletic Union, Chairman Fred Ruben
announced here last night that the Na-
tional Board of Registration declined to
sanction a tour of the United States by
the Australian amateur women swim-
mers, Fanny Durack and Mina Wylie,
under the management of George H.
Dowling, a promoter, who resides in
Seattle.

The board, however, will permit the
women, who are now in San Francisco,
to compete in any of the scheduled A. U.
championship swimming events if they
choose to abide by the rules which
permit a chaperone, but not a manager
to accompany woman athletes.

AFGHAN AFFAIR IS AIRED IN COMMONS

London, July 17.—(Reuter's)—Sir Ed-
win Montagu, secretary for India, said
in the House of Commons yesterday
that, except for outpost affairs, there
was now no fighting in Afghanistan.
There was reason to hope that the Af-
ghan peace delegates would arrive in the
British lines on July 22.

Viscount Curzon asked if it was the
intention to allow the Amir to retain
the throne in view of his unprovoked at-
tack on British territory.

Sir Edwin replied that the object of
the government was to secure the frontiers
against the recurrence of such an
unprovoked attack. The government at
present did not intend to express any
opinion as to who would be the future
ruler of Afghanistan.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The Prince of Wales is to leave Ports-
mouth by H. M. S. Renown on August
6. Landing at St. John's, Nfld., he will
proceed by light cruiser to St. John and
Charlottetown and then to Halifax.

The National Industrial Conference
has been called for Sept. 11. All pro-
vincial premiers will attend and there
will be representatives of all industries
and organizations of employees.

S. O., M. P., addressed a public meeting

which the Canadians had taken part in

who had given his life, Capt. D. M.
Moore of Hopewell Hill. Several re-

SHERICK DIES AS HE FACES MAGISTRATE

Ontario Farmer, Who Shot Man,
Succumbs to Shock in Court

Collingwood, Ont., July 17.—Under es-
pecially peculiar circumstances a double
tragedy was enacted here yesterday. It
began on the farm of Amos Sherick,
on the outskirts of the town, early this
morning, when Sherick fired a shotgun
at a young man named John Mooney,
when he found him in his pig sty, and
who was endeavoring to make his escape
from the place. It ended by the sudden
death of Sherick in the police court
when standing before Police Magistrate
Hogg preparing to listen to the formal
charge of murder which had been laid
against him by the police.

Mooney was a returned soldier, about
thirty years old. Sherick was in his
66th year. He was a very quiet man
and highly respected.

The shock of the death of Mooney
undoubtedly caused Sherick's death.

PRESIDENTIAL ORDER ON WHEAT MATTERS

Washington, July 16.—President Wilson
today signed an executive order increas-
ing the guaranteed price of the 1919
wheat crop to \$2.30 a bushel at Galveston
and New Orleans.

At the same time a presidential pro-
clamation was issued declaring, in order
to protect the United States against un-
due enhancement of its liabilities under
the law guaranteeing wheat prices, that
on and after July 1, no wheat or wheat
flour should be imported into or ex-
ported from the United States except
under prescribed limitations to be fixed
by Wheat Administrator Barnes.

SOVIET OFFICERS DESERTING

Budapest, July 16.—(By the Ass'd
Press).—Officers of the Soviet army are
deserting whenever they find chance to
do so. The armed forces apparently are
slowly disintegrating. Almost the entire
air corps has abandoned the army.

Bela Kun, Soviet leader, has broken
off with nearly all the socialist leaders.
He has told Sigmund Kunfi, his minis-
ter of education, and others, that he is
trying to ride socialist and communist
horses at the same time.
