**MORE EVIDENCE OF DEFECTIVE GEAR**

Crew of Collier Alden Noticed Empress Zig-Zagging Down St. Lawrence — Captain Murray's Experiment

Quebec, June 19—The alleged defective steering gear of the Empress of Ireland and the rapidity with which she went to the bottom of the St. Lawrence after being struck by the collier Sturston on May 29, formed the two most conspicuous details connected with the calamity enquired into today by the dominion commission sitting in the court house here.

On the first of these two points, evidence was submitted by a number of sailors and Pilot Napoleon Lapierre, who were on the collier Alden, which was used by the Empress around the time that she was said to be steering badly by James Galway, a quartermaster, who claimed yesterday that the liner's helm jammed for three minutes on the night of the disaster. These witnesses agreed that the Empress, as the pilot put it, zig-zagged down the river, though they all had to confess that while still a good distance away she showed red to red in conformity with navigation laws and passed more than a cable's length away.

Captain Murray, a former commander of the Empress of Ireland, described how he had experimented with her sister ship and had put her from full speed ahead to full stop in two minutes and fifteen seconds.

After a close cross-examination by Mr. Meighart, as to whether such a severe strain was usually put on the engines under normal conditions, and after Captain Murray had said it was not, the witness explained that the officer on the bridge could indicate the necessity for hurry in going astern by simply giving two rings on the telegraph.

Napoleon Lapierre, the pilot on the Collier Alden, swore that the Empress of Ireland, as she approached the ship he was in charge of on the night of May 29, zig-zagged, showing first her red light a couple of times and then her green. At one time she was showing both her red and green together. Ultimately she went by a cable's length away.

**TROUBLE FOR COLONEL SAM**

Ottawa, June 19—Colonel the Hon. Sam Hughes, has got his political and his military tactics badly mixed up. As a result he is unprotected against a lively cross fire.

The colonel's explanation of the apparent "mutiny" of the 69th regiment of Montreal, in carrying out the parade of the Corpus Christi procession on Sunday of last week, contrary to regulations, has not appeared. The Orangemen, Sgt. Dario, who are now attacking him through the Orange Sentinel. His allegations to prevent the parade, from following its time-honored custom and "presenting arms" to the Host has brought him trouble from Quebec.
