MAKING BREAD IN SHEETS. Women of the Mohl Indians in the district of New Mexico make bread in sheets no thicker than a sheet of paper. The corn, of which the bread is made, is ground between two heavy stones until it becomes very fine. Then it is mixed with water and a very thin batter prepared. This batter is spread on a hot stone over a fire, where it is allowed to bake for a considerable time. When one side is baked the other is turned. Sheet after sheet is baked in this manner. No salt is used in the batter, and the bread has a sweetish taste. It is usually blue, taking the color of the corn from which it is made.

SHAKE-UP AS RESULT OF JAIL INVESTIGATION. Quebec, Sept. 5.—Drastic changes and reforms in the management of the Quebec jail will be recommended following the investigation conducted by Dr. Woods, provincial inspector of prisons. Two months ago three men scaled the prison walls and got away, one was recaptured, the other two are still at liberty. Two guards were suspended and an investigation was instituted but before the doctor had time to submit his report to the government there was another escape. This occasioned the second inquiry, and the result, it is said, will be a general shake up among the officers of the jail, as well as among those of the provincial police force.
