

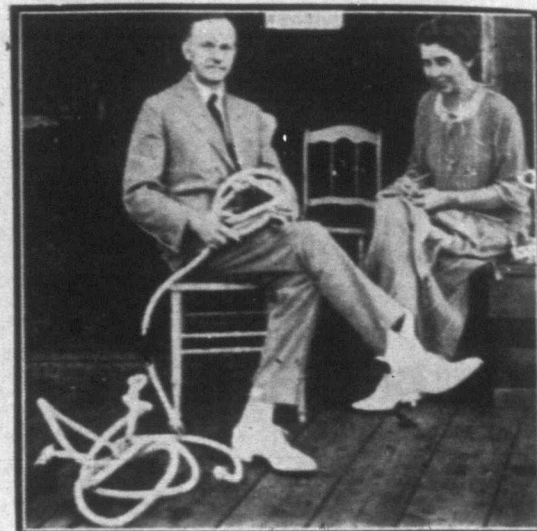

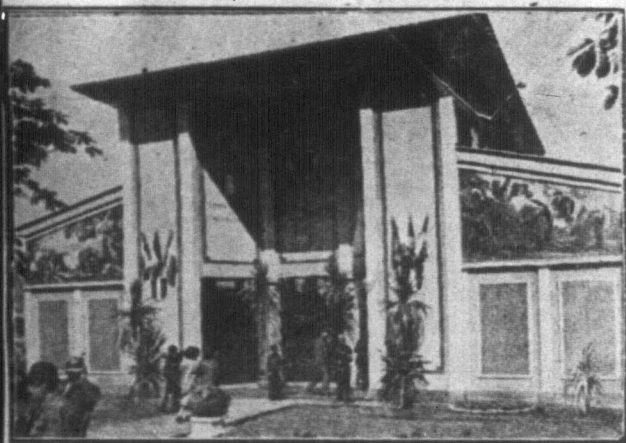
This Russian family, reaching New York on the "Bellanca," say they paid 1,000,000 rubles for passports to America.



Illinois troops at camp near Joliet, Ill., where there have been serious riots in the railway strike.



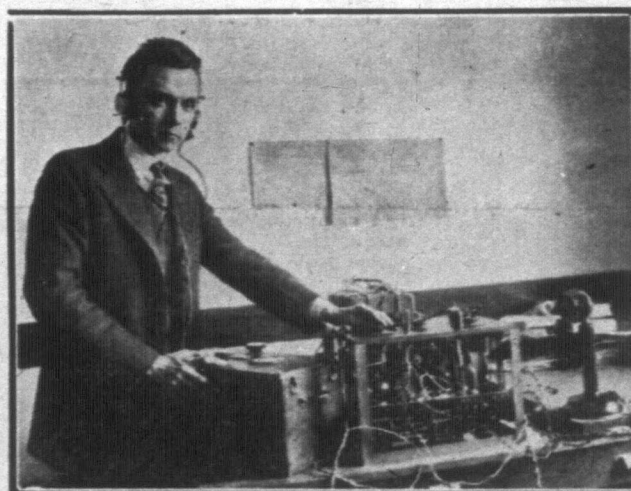
Parisian parasol of light blue taffeta, accordion pleated, with scalloped edges.



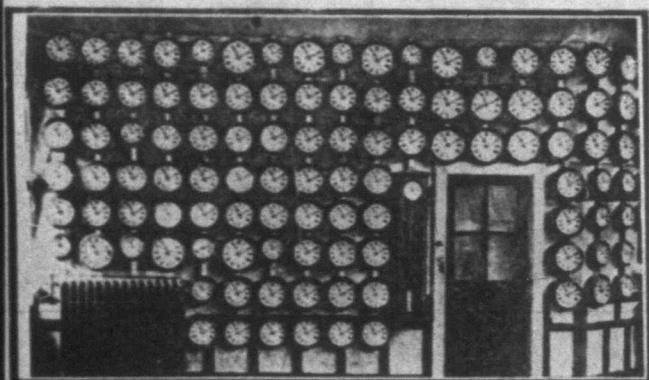
There has been an international exposition at Riga, Latvia, formerly a Russian port on the Baltic. This is the French pavilion at the exposition.



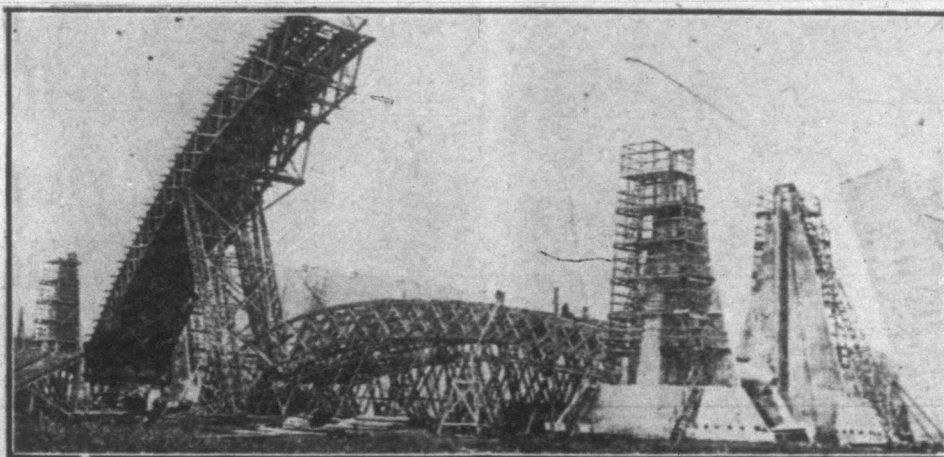
Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., newspaper reporter, interviews Mayor Hylan, of New York.
