Drivers of vehicles of all sorts would do well to note that the civic by-law respecting driving on the public thoroughfares is going to be strictly enforced. Hereafter the proper side of the road—the left—must be kept, corners must be turned cleanly and the speed limit must be observed.

Mayor Hall told the Times this morning that the police would be instructed to enforce proper attention to the rules and an example will be made of any one, driving or motoring, who disre been made to his worship by citizens. Breaches of the law are frequent on all points. In turning corners some drivers seem to be trying how close they can go, and frequently persons waiting for a car have to step well back to avoid being struck by the wagon.
