RESERVATION OF WATER.

The water so reserved may be acquired from the Crown under authority of the "Water Conservation Act" by any person specially incorporated company, for use for the purposes above mentioned, upon such terms and conditions as may be determined by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

FOR FISHERY SERVICE. One of the Cape Scott colonists, a man named Hansen, is engaged in constructing the hull for a new steamer, which he intends for the fishing business. The vessel, when ready, will be taken down to Victoria to be equipped with gasoline engines, and when complete will be employed in catching fish for the local market.
