PROHIBITION IN MAINE.

The Bangor Commercial—and it is so sober and well conducted a journal that it is impossible to suspect the editor of personal motives—is making strong demand for the repeal of the prohibitory law in the state of Maine on the ground that it has proved itself not only inefficient as regards preventing intemperance but absolutely injurious to the state as a whole and ruinous to many individuals.

It admits that the amount of liquor sold has decreased but shows an increasing number of arrests for drunkenness, especially since the recent rigid enforcement under the Sturgis law. This it explains by the assertion that the traffic has been driven into secret places where only poisonous mixtures are to be obtained, a small amount of which will put a man into a state of intoxication. The Commercial predicts that if the consumption of these poisonous mixtures continues there will be a large increase in the number of the insane in this state as well as in the number of drunkards.

Other direct inferences are charged by the Commercial to a law which prevents the sale of alcoholic stimulants by a druggist in cases of sickness and which forces thousands of summer tourists to leave the state or suffer great agony from thirst. "Thousands of people from other states," it says, "come into Maine every summer, many of whom are beginning to look upon this fanatical enforcement as interfering with their rights, and it is more than probable that the state will lose a large amount of business in the future by such people spending their summers in some other state."

"The state of Maine, says this protesting journal in conclusion, 'has tried prohibition for over fifty years and yet, after the lapse of half a century, we are still experimenting with it. Of the other states of the union that followed Maine's example and gave prohibition a trial, all have discarded it save one. Even Maine's sister states in the New England group, although much slower to change from prohibition to regulation than the western states, have been more progressive in this regard than Maine. Inducements are offered by the railroads and summer resort managers who spend thousands of dollars to get people into Maine, but after coming here, the state through its prohibitory law attempts to regulate their conduct as to their use of alcoholic stimulants. It is to be hoped that the people of Maine are becoming too cosmopolitan to continue much longer the farce of prohibition; and if the present method continues, it will not be long before the state follows the example of Massachusetts, Vermont and New Hampshire, whose people could not be induced to return to the former prohibitory law.'"

A HUMILIATING SITUATION.

A Canadian sea captain is in a prison down in Uruguay. His imprisonment is unjust, but in spite of demands from Canada and Great Britain the Uruguayan government refuses to release him.

For the credit of the Dominion this injustice must be stopped and reparation compelled. But how? Canada has no means of compelling a foreign nation. The British navy? What right has the Canadian government to ask the British taxpayer, to whom it has devoted thousands of dollars and run the risk of war for the sake of one Canadian?

Of course, if other means fail, the British government will send ships to rescue this man because he is a British subject though he belongs to a part of the empire which values the term a little that is not willing to help sustain its prestige. But is not the situation a little humiliating?

COMMISSIONER McISAAC.

Mr. McIsaac, the late member for Antigonish, who has been appointed to the railway construction commission, is a reputable public man. He is a lawyer of good ability. Though he has no knowledge of railway construction and operation that objection cannot be raised at this stage. It seems to be the settled policy of the government that the commissioners should be politicians and that they should go to their duty absolutely unbiased by any knowledge of the kind of work they have to do. Considered as a politician Mr. McIsaac is eminently satisfactory. He is affable, reasonable, and so far as we have heard, has an honorable record.—Sun.

A pithy exhibition of spite is this refusal of the Liberal government to give J. Lorne McDougall, a faithful servant of over a quarter of a century, the superannuation allowance which he requested and to which he is by law entitled. Because he has interfered with their plundering of the treasury they cut him with the most meagre allowance possible and but for the superannuation act would undoubtedly have thrown him out with nothing. It is a risk business to get between the Grigs and hoodie. This will probably be a lesson to the new auditor general.

LOCAL NEWS.

Notwithstanding the statements that have been made in several papers to the effect that the salmon in the pond at Carleton has been practically exterminated by some mysterious disease, F. H. Cunningham of Ottawa, superintendent of fish culture, who has been investigating the matter, told the Sun last evening that there were still about twelve hundred fish in the pond. Mr. Cunningham was rather annoyed that such untrue statements should have been sent broadcast.

Fred Carpenter, son of J. T. Carpenter, 123 Paradise Row, was thrown out of his carriage last night and badly hurt. Mr. Carpenter had been out for a drive early in the evening and coming in about 11 o'clock his horse took fright on the City road, some distance from Haymarket square. The animal dashed up the road and in attempting to make the turn at the Wall street iron bridge, collided with the structure, smashing the carriage and throwing Mr. Carpenter heavily to the ground. He struck on his head and side, and lay stunned. The horse pulled the rig clear of the bridge and continued its career.

Two of Messrs. Quinn & Co.'s workmen had a narrow escape yesterday while placing a tin gutter on a Main street house. The ladder on the roof slipped and would have fallen thirty feet to the pavement below had not a rope fortunately caught it. The men saw that it was secure before they again started work.

The case of James Driscoll of Hotel Edward for selling liquor during prohibited hours was taken up again in police court yesterday afternoon. Mr. Driscoll and his clerk were both put on the stand and gave evidence to the effect that the man Austin had never been served with liquor after hours. Austin did not show up to give evidence his honor dismissed the case.

J. W. Long of Lancaster, is making preparations for the resumption of work on the breakwater, and in a week or so will start with a gang of about forty men. During last fall and early spring Mr. Long was engaged in constructing this breakwater, and the ultimate intention is to have the whole affair made of solid concrete. This will be a very extensive undertaking, and will cost a small fortune.

Thomas Hetherington, Immigration Agent for Canada in the eastern States, is in the city, through his work 280 persons, by far the greater number of them Canadians by birth, have been led to seek homes for themselves in the Northwest. Mr. Hetherington says that 75 per cent. of the people of Canadian birth in New England have never been naturalized.
