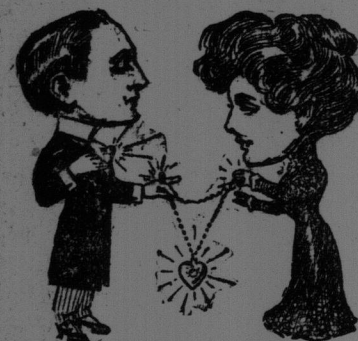

During the eighth inning of the St. Peter's-St. Joseph game Saturday afternoon Shortstop Long, of the St. Josephs, lost his temper when struck out and threw the bat at Umpire Carroll. Long was not put out of the game for his actions as he should have been. Carroll has resigned his position as official umpire.

A carriage owned by Fred Duncan which has been sent down from Fredericton for repairs, bears the scars of a recent smash-up which occurred in the capital city. All four of its light bicycle wheels were smashed up and the vehicle presents a generally dilapidated appearance. No one was hurt when the runaway occurred, in which the carriage met disaster.

Abbie Wood, with his trainer, J. Whelan, arrived from Montreal last night and are at the Queen. Hans Holmer, with Manager Shoe, will arrive this afternoon by the Maritime Express. The race takes place at the Arena Monday night, and the distance will be 15 miles. There is considerable interest throughout the country over this race, as there is much difference of opinion as to the winner of the race at the distance—Halifax Recorder.

The Maritime Province will not be represented at the C. A. A. U. championships at Winnipeg. The C. A. A. U. have been making efforts to have P. O. Schaefer, of Halifax, the 100 yards champion; W. Ross, of Halifax, the 1-1/2 mile champion, and Dr. G. G. McDonald, of New Glasgow, the holder of three C. A. A. U. championships, go to Winnipeg, but as much as they would like to make the trip their business engagements will prevent.

During the past week progress has been made in the work of tearing down the Matthews building on Charlotte street. The super-structure has now been removed and this morning the foundation was being taken up. The old building will give place to a handsome new branch of The Bank of New Brunswick. Robert Maxwell, the chief contractor, will start in immediately at the erection of the building. Frank E. Jones will be the wiring.

SPENDS HER NIGHTS SLEEPING IN BOX CARS

Young Woman, Who Claims New Glasgow as Her Home, Arrested as a Vagrant.

There were nine prisoners on the penitentiary bench this morning. Four of the number were only common drunks and were dealt with in the usual manner, besides being given some sound advice on the evils of drunkenness.

John McTavish pleaded guilty to being drunk but did not remember being profane. He was told that he was liable to a fine of \$15, and was remanded.

Thomas McCann, while under the influence of liquor, had occasion to chase some annoying boys on Adelaide St., Saturday afternoon, and was profane. He was fined eight dollars.

Philip McGowan denied being drunk on Union street about 3:30 o'clock this morning. Policeman Belyea gave evidence that the defendant was staggering drunk. The defendant said he was not drunk and that he had been with James McGarrigle, a North End friend, all day and night. He said he left Mrs. Burns' boarding house on Union street shortly after ten o'clock last night as it was too early to go to bed. He spent the night walking around with McGarrigle and finally put in a hour or more on a Union St. door step conversing. Shortly after they parted the policeman came along and arrested the defendant. He was remanded to jail until such time as McGarrigle can give evidence. McGarrigle says that McGowan was sober when they parted. The case may be heard this afternoon.

Florence Davidson, a young woman of about 24 years of age is a tramp, and is now in jail awaiting sentence for vagrancy. The woman claims to have come New Glasgow while it is said Dorchester was her home. She arrived here about a month and a half ago and found a home with Amelia Francis, a colored proprietress of a Sheffield street house. Of late she has had no home and has been sleeping at nights in the box cars on the ballast wharf or in any old shed or shelter that she could find.

Fred Holston was fined \$30 for assaulting his cousin, Wm. Kennedy, on Thursday last. The fine was allowed to stand as Kennedy did not wish to prosecute.

SAY GEORGE LEWIS DEFRAUDED THEM

North End Men Victims of Bogus Cheque Scheme.

Wm. J. Savage and Wm. Lunney Lose \$18 Each—Frost & Wood Co.'s Name Said to Have Been Forged.

Two North End citizens have been victimized by a man supposed to be one George Lewis, an ex-employee of the Frost and Wood Company, on King Square. William J. Savage and William Lunney are the sufferers, and the amount in each case advanced was \$18. A warrant will be issued this afternoon for the arrest of Lewis.

Evidently conscious of the fact that he could secure the advance the man approached Mr. Savage at his place of business at 265 Main street on Saturday afternoon. He told a story about no funds being available and asked Mr. Savage to give him \$18 in exchange for a cheque. The latter after some hesitation agreed to advance the amount. Therefore Lewis produced a cheque book and wrote out an order on the Bank of New Brunswick for the eighteen dollars. He presented the cheque to Mr. Savage who proceeded to examine it.

Mr. Savage soon detected an error in the writing of the cheque. The name of Frost and Wood had been marked through with pencil. However, Lewis assured him that nothing was wrong. He stated he was in the employ of the Company.

Lewis secured the same amount from Mr. Lunney without any great difficulty. Upon presenting the cheque for payment at the North End branch of the Bank of New Brunswick this morning, Mr. Savage found that he had been the victim of fraud. Soon after Mr. Lunney also discovered that Lewis had cheated him.

The bank manager, upon examination of the cheques found that the name had been forged. The signature was as follows:—Frost & Wood, per W. F. Burned, manager.

Communication was secured by the bank with W. F. Burditt, manager of Frost and Wood Company. The belief that the cheques had been forged was substantiated, when Mr. Burditt declared that the company did not know anything of the issuance of the cheques.

Speaking with a Star representative this morning, Mr. Savage expressed his intention of issuing a warrant for the arrest of Lewis.

W. F. Burditt, when seen, stated that the attempt at forgery had been a poor one. Lewis had failed, whether intentionally or not, to spell "Burditt" correctly.

HOPE TO OCCUPY NEW QUARTERS THIS WEEK

Top Floor of City Hall Almost Ready for Water & Sewerage Dept.—No Fire-proof Vault for Valuable Papers

The top floor of the City Hall is now about ready for occupancy and City Engineer Murdoch hopes to transfer the staff of the water and sewerage department from the Leinster street building to their new quarters some time this week.

The chief disadvantage of their new offices, apart from the difficulty of climbing three long flights of stairs to get to them, is found in the fact that there is no vault on the top floor and in case of fire the many valuable plans which the department has on hand would almost inevitably be destroyed. It is understood that the engineer is seeking some way to overcome this difficulty.

WE GET FIFTEEN HOURS OF SUNSHINE TODAY

The Longest Day of the Year and the Beginning of Summer—It is Also Halifax's Natal Day.

Today marked the opening of the summer season. It is also the longest day in the year. The day dawned fine and warm and the weather prospects are splendid.

As early as 4:41 o'clock this morning the sun peeped out and it will continue to shine this evening until 8:10 o'clock. After today the periods of sunshine will steadily grow shorter until December 21, when the shortest day in the year comes around again. On that day there will be about nine hours of sunshine.

At Halifax, June 21 is observed as the City's Natal Day. A few programmes of sports and amusements have been arranged in honor of the day.

The committee on the mayor's inaugural address will meet this afternoon to consider the various recommendations made at the first of the civic year. The committee consists of Aldermen Scully, Eakin, McDermid and Lasky, with His Worship as chairman.

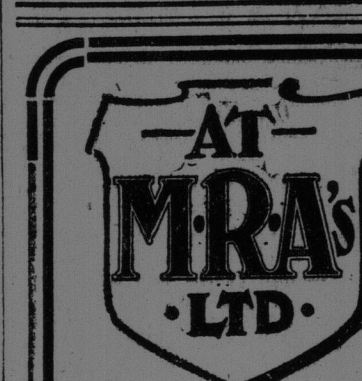
