COMMONS HEARS DETAILS OF ANGLO-GERMAN TROUBLE YESTERDAY.

Continued from Page 1.

It was proposed as the basis of a settlement between Germany and France and said he thought the matter might be arranged on such a basis without affecting British interests.

Anxiety for Settlement.

"We shall be very glad if this happens, and in the hope that it would happen, we have hitherto stood on one side," Sir Edward Grey said to the Ambassador, and continued: "But I had been made anxious by the news regarding the demands which the German government had made from the French government, which in effect meant a cession of the French Congo, and which it was obviously impossible for the French government to concede. I pointed out that the Germans were in the closed port of Agadir and they were landing and negotiating with the tribes, and for all we knew might be acquiring concessions. It might also be that the German flag had been hoisted at Agadir, which is the most suitable port on that coast for a naval base."

Sir Edward Grey pointed out to Count Wolff-Metternich that in the event of the negotiations with France failing Great Britain would be obliged to take some steps in order to protect British interests.

The German Ambassador was not in a position to impart any information to the British foreign office, but he

depreciated the assumption of possible damage to British interests and said he was sure that his government had no intention of acquiring commercial monopolies.

The communication made to the British foreign office by the German Ambassador, Count Paul Wolff-Metternich on July 1, in regard to the despatch of the German gunboat Panther to Agadir in southern Morocco, and the Ambassador's explanation in regard to that matter, continued Sir Edward Grey, made it clear that Germany regarded a return to the status quo in Morocco as impossible, and that Germany's real objective was a definite solution of the whole Moroccan question.

Critical Moment.

On July 2, Sir Edward Grey informed the German ambassador that the situation created by the despatch of the Panther to Agadir was so serious and important that it must be discussed at a cabinet council, and on July 4, he told Count Wolff-Metternich that Great Britain was not able to take up a disinterested attitude concerning Morocco nor to recognize any new arrangement come to without her consent.

A long silent followed and the next conversation between Sir Edward Grey and Count Wolff-Metternich took place on July 21 when the British foreign secretary told the German ambassador that the British government adhered to his statement made on July 4.

Thenceforward there were no further difficulties. "A good deal of misunderstanding could have been avoided," remarked Sir Edward, "if Germany had made it clear about July fourth that she had no intention of taking part of Morocco."

Disastrous Policy.

Alluding to the policy of isolation, Sir Edward Grey thought it would be a disastrous policy for Great Britain to allow it to be understood that she would under no circumstances give her friends assistance if attacked. That would deprive her of all of her friends in Europe and she would soon be building warships against the rest of the world.

On the other hand, England continually interfered in the international affairs of other nations as had been proposed by some members of the House of Commons, the consequence would be an expenditure on armaments even greater than at present.

"I desire to improve our relations with Germany and intend to maintain our friendships unimpaired. The German imperial chancellor recently made two speeches which were inspired with the hope of seeing his country strong by his aggressive. If that is the spirit of German policy, then within two or three years the talk of a great European war will have gone. The effect of the Moroccan settlement must be to relax tension and to remove a great obstacle from the path of European progress. For years the question of Morocco has been a discomfort to diplomats. It has been settled without breaking the peace of Europe and the part His Majesty's government has taken, has con-

tributed materially to that result."

Honour Law, leader of the Unionists, in a speech strongly supporting Sir Edward Grey, said that the foreign secretary's statement had convinced that every step taken was with a sole regard for British interest.

SCOTS PREPARE FOR DINNER ON THURSDAY

The banquet of the St. Andrew's Society which will be held at the Royal Hotel Thursday evening promises to be one of the most interesting functions in the history of the society. Sir Andrew Fraser, formerly Lieut-governor of Bengal, is coming to St. John especially to attend the banquet, and he will be one of the principal speakers. Rev. J. J. McCaskill, pastor of St. Matthew's church, will deliver a formal oration on St. Andrew's Day.

Up to last evening the committee in charge of the affairs had not completed the list of speakers, but they have prepared a fine program of musical and vocal selections. It is expected that there will be a large attendance.

In the voting contest for the most popular driver in the West End fire department, C. W. Christopher, driver of No. 6 hose was first with 1236 votes, winning a fur cap, collar and gloves; D. O'Keefe, of No. 7, was second, with 1100 votes and E. Brittain was third with 1000 votes. The fair was a grand success.

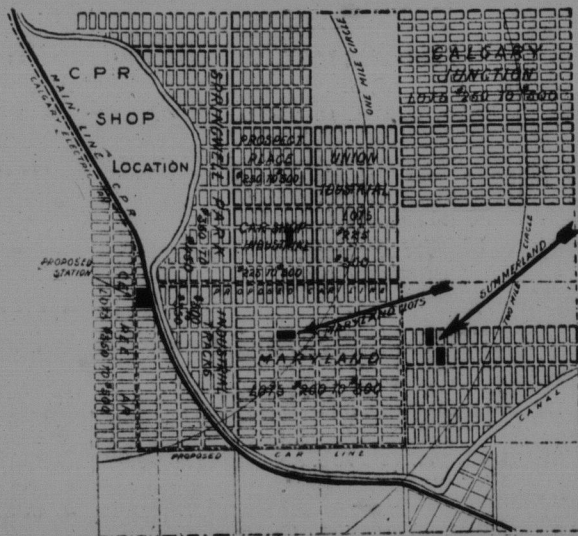

The Great C.P.R. Shops Awarded to Calgary
